Four of our members helped with the Christmas Count sponsored by the Point Reyes Bird Observatory. Gordon Bolander, Brent Waver, and Mike Parmeter served as a team counting birds along the northern shore of Limantour Estero. Jack Guggolz served as organizer and compiler as he has done other years. For the day 183 species were noted by all parties despite high winds.

Mike reports that highlights of their sightings included White Pelicans, Snow Geese, a male Old Squaw in winter plu mage. Common Gallinule, Red Phalaropes, Tree and Violet-green Swallows, Yellowthroat, and Rufus-crowned Sparrow. They were also fortunate enough to see an immature Cattle Egret at the Olema Marsh. The bird was quite confiding and allowed close approach. This is a first record of this species in the San Francisco Bay area.

Six of our members were guest observers in the Western Sonoma County count sponsored by the Madrone Audubon Society. In spite of the three inches of rain that day 154 species plus one "race" were observed with a tot al of 33,312 individual birds counted.

A detailed account of the Santa Rosa Christmas Count, sponsored by this society, compiled and stencils cut by our Baron McLean, is attached. (Thanks, Baron!)

Quoting Mr. Failing, our Field Trip Chairman, "The town of Rio Vista is easy to find and is on the road map." Bo out Route 80 towards Travis AFB turning off on Route 12 throu Fairfield. Rio Vista is about 21 miles east of Fairfield on Route 12.) We will leave the meeting place in a group and go to Thornton, birding on the way, where we meet the State Ranger at about 11:00 a.m. We will have a chance to talk with him about the cranes and other birds. Besides the cranes we should see swans, geese and perhaps the Rough-legged Hawk as well as other hawks. Mr. Failing adds that for wildlife-minded travelers the Elk-Horn Cafe in Rio Vista is well worth while, and a big surprise for anyone who has not been there. Lunch, or coffee, anybody?

### JANUARY FIELD TRIP
