

CALIFORNIA BIRDS, a new quarterly journal devoted to field ornithology in California and the West, is soon to be published by California Field Ornithologists.

The journal will focus on subjects related to all aspects of field investigation, results of field observation and study, and problems of field identification. It will fill a long-felt need for a medium of communication between field ornithologists, one devoted olely to their interests.

The long-awaited first issue, now in press, will contain a complete, up-to-date list of the birds of California, the first since Grinnell and Miller; an article on identification of Common and Arctic Terns; and a discussion of the status of the American Redstart in California.
