WINTER COMES BY WAY OF SOUTH AMERICA ____

The repular meeting of the RROS will be held on Thursday, February 8, in Room 221 of the Charles Darwin Hall of Science, California State College-Sonoma in Rohnert Park. Program starts at 8 PM.

We are fortunate to have as our speaker of the evening, Jon Winter, who will speak on THE OCEANIC BIRDS OF SOUTH AMERICA. Illustrations will be in the media of his own excellent slides which cover a wider range than just the birds in the area. Do bring your friends to enjoy this fine entertainment.

FEBRUARY FIELD TRIP

Our trip, set for Saturday, the 17th, will be our traditional February visit to the Thornton area. This bit of central valley habitat always has much of interest that we "coastal dwellers" don't usually encounter in our own areas. Swans, geese, and cranes are expected in good supply. Last year a Bald Eagle and early Cliff Swallows were welcome surprises. A less welcome one was the low state of the surface waters. There should be a more copious supply this year and the birds will probably be less concentrated. We expect to list between 85 and 90 species, using the numbers found during the past three trips as indicators; 89, 88, and 86.

As before, the "early birds" will start from the east edge of Fairfield at 7:30 AM and the entire party will leave from the east side of the river across the bridge from Rio Vista on Highway 12 at 9 AM.

ARNOLD ADDS ANOTHER

Dr. 'Jack' Arnold reports the sighting of a male Barrow Goldeneye at Bodega Harbor on January 27. This constitutes the first recording of the species within the confines of Sonoma County. In addition, he also reports that there was a beautiful male Harlequin Duck at the same spot. It is a species not usually recorded in such a sheltered situation.

CHRISTMAS COUNT LIST

This is included for all (I hope) who have not already received a copy. Our total is reported as 125 species but three seem to have been overlooked in the tabulation. I believe, and this needs verification, that those missing are: Black-crowned Night Heron, Downy Woodpecker, and Hairy Woodpecker.
