COMING ATTRACTIONS

April 30, Saturday, 7:30 AM: Field Trip to Ida Clayton Road

Mike Parmeter will meet the group at the junction of Ida Clayton Road and Hwy 128, about 7½ miles northwest of Calistoga. Carpooling is recommended as the road is narrow and twisting. Good birds up this way: Gnatcatchers, many raptors, possibly California Thrasher and Mountain Quail.

May 14, Saturday, Field Trip to King's Ridge Road

Meet for carpooling at <u>Bailey Field, SRJC, at 7 AM</u>. Parking at some of the stops on this trip is very limited, so carpool if you can. Or meet at 8 AM where Hwy 116 crosses Austin Creek Bridge near Austin Creek Rd.

Doug Ellis will lead us on a search for breeding birds and Spring migrants, such as Golden Eagle, Western Screech Owl, American Dipper, Pileated Woodpecker, Solitary Vireo, Common Merganser, Wood Duck, Black-throated Gray Warbler, Lark Sparrow and Chipping Sparrow.

May 28 - 30: Memorial Day Weekend at Tule Lake and Lava Beds National Monument

Ruth Rudesill will be driving up Friday, May 27, and will try to nail down two campsites. Lava Beds campground Visitor Center phone is (916) 667-2282, but they do not take reservations. The cost is \$5/night. The nights will be cold, and stores are not close, so bring warm bedding and plenty of food...and warm clothes. For more information, please call Ruth at 833-6026, if you are going.

This beautiful high desert country is home to innumerable nesting ducks and geese, Golden and Bald Eagles, Mountain Bluebirds and Say's Phoebes, Prairie Falcons and Pinyon Jays. Barn Owls have been flushed from the lava tubes, and Great Horned Owls nest in niches on the escarpment. Besides the Lava Beds and Tule Lake areas, we will bird the Lower Klamath National Wildlife Refuge.

BIRDATHON WALK

Richard Merriss and Rick LeBaudeur hiked across Santa Rosa for Madrone Audubon's Birdathon on April 16. They started with the dawn chorus at Channel Drive in Annadel SP, where the <u>Chats</u> were singing. They walked over to Spring Lake and on to Lake Ralphine.

They found Band-tailed Pigeons in the walnut orchard along Montgomery Drive, and about that time a flock of six <u>Canada Geese</u> went honking overhead. On their way through Doyle Park, they found a <u>Bushtit</u> nest. They made their way to Julliard Park and crossed the freeway on the overhead at Burbank School, landing in a small park on the west side, Olive Park.

They skirted Santa Rosa Creek along West 3rd Street as far as Fulton Rd. Then they followed the railroad right-of-way to the Llano Rd sewer ponds. At Brown Farm pond, a <u>Golden Eagle</u> flew overhead. They next headed west on the road to the Laguna de Santa Rosa, ending up at the baseball field near the Sebastopol Community Center, where they spotted a Cattle Egret.

Altogether they observed 98 birds for the Birdathon...a fine day's total!

BIRDATHON RIDE

Ruth Rudesill atarted forth on her Birdathon
April 16 at Kenwood, where she met Karen Nagel,
Bill Paine and John McDonagh. They listened for
owls at Sugarloaf Ridge SP and on Cavedale Rd.
They heard Great Horned Owls; and in the chaparral
along Cavedale Rd they found Pileated Woodpecker,
Blue-gray Gnatcatchers and a Sage Sparrow.

Proceeding on to Annadel SP, they met Roger Marlowe and John Chostner along Channel Drive. There they saw Chat, Pileated Woodpecker and Pygmy Owl.


The Birdathoners then drove down Russian River to Duncans Mill. They saw several <u>Osprey</u> nests, and Osprey were fishing at the mouth of the river. A Sharp-shinned Hawk was spotted at Bridgehaven.

Goat Rock was a staging area for thousands of migrating Western Grebes. Gray Whales were breeching near Goat Rock — a special bonus for the birders!

In Bodega Bay were a large flock of migrant Brant.
Blue-winged Teal were spotted in the bay near the
entrance to the Marine Lab. The grebes, loons and
Ruddy Turnstones are all coming into breeding plumage spectacular! Also, said Ruth, they had a good look
at the Virginia Rail.

Turning back towards Sebastopol, the birders stopped at Llano Rd sewer ponds, where they found another Blue-winged Teal and some Wood Ducks.

Altogether, the Birdathoners spotted 136 species for an excellent day's work.

The word from Bryan Bland, a professional British birder, is that Mandarin Ducks, since being imtroduced to England long ago, are thriving there far better than they ever did in their native China. They seem to like Sonoma County, too, and favor the same nest boxes as our native Wood Ducks.
