Field Trip Report: Bodega Bay - October 15, 1988

Early morning mists, gently compacting into rolling billows of coastal fog that receded and advanced throughout the morning, made Bodega Bay a visual wonderland for our October 15th field trip.

Virginia Rails scooted in and out of the marshy ponds on Westside Road, while scores of Yellow-rumped Warblers flitted through the willows. All of our old friends were there, and a few new ones too. That goes for the birds as well as the people.

Now, if you are expecting a really impressive bird list, we can supply you with one. That would be all of those birds that had been seen in Bodega Bay earlier that week. (See observations). So we concentrated on the regulars, and let ourselves get excited over an unusual flicker with very yellow shafts on the wings. A Merlin and a Nashville Warbler showed themselves briefly to a few of our group, and a Great Horned Owl posed patiently in a eucalyptus for all.

By mid-afternoon the sun was out and we were down to our last layers. In spite of crowds on Doran Beach, both Semi-palmated and Snowy Plovers were found hunkering down in the depressions made by the passers-by. It was warm, and calm, and soon it was quiet.

Field Trip Report: Limantour - October 29

Ruth Rudesill led 8 birders starting at Limantour for shorebirds, ducks and raptors; then later to Inverness Ridge for landbirds, and ending the afternoon at Shield's Marsh. Following are the 96 species seen:
