Sandhill Cranes, Tundra Swans, hawks, Don Quik Store, and ducks are target birds for the Delta, and Short-eared Owls are the Grizzly Island specialty. Dan Nelson is the leader for the trip, and we all

join him in hoping for clearer weather than in '89. Walking is on level roads or paths, but prepare for possible muddy areas. Please bring lunch. For those planning to go to Grizzly Island in the afternoon, the California Department of Fish and Game Save Our Wild Places fee of \$2.25 per person goes into effect on January 1, 1990. Grizzly Island is one of nine wildlife areas included in the newly authorized fees. Annual passes are also available for \$10. SONOMA COUNTY BIG DAYS

Two Sonoma County Big Days were held on April 29th; the first one in 1978 Laurence Binford, John and Mike Parmeter, and Kent Van Vuren, and the second one in 1989 with Doug Ellis, Dan Nelson and Ruth Rudesill.

Mike and his group found 171 species while Doug, Dan, and Ruth saw 162. Assuming the level of expertise to be similar, and as the April date is the same, the difference in success may have been the routes taken or the weather. Ruth did report poor weather on the 1989 Big Day, and conditions on the 1978 count was not available. As to the routes taken, the Binford, Parmeter, Van Vuren group started at Rudemann Slough where they found rails, to Ida Clayton Road for owls and landbirds, to Franz Valley Road, the Russian River, Jenner, the Sonoma Coast, Bodega Bay, and the Laguna de The Ellis, Nelson, Rudesill party started on Skaggs Springs Santa Rosa. Road to Annapolis, Gualala, then via Tin Barn Road and King Ridge Road to Cazadero, on to the mouth of the Russian River, to Bodega Bay, Petaluma and on to Ramal Road, to Cavedale Road and then to Sonoma Valley. AOU NAME CHANGES

The 37th Supplement to the American Ornithologists Union Checklist of North American Birds contains several changes. The ones that concern the birds commonly reported in the Kite Tales are the Western Flycatcher, now the Pacific Slope Flycatcher (west of the crest of the Sierras); the Water Pipit, now the American Pipit; and the Brown Towhee, the California Towhee.
