> Mike reported the Yellow-bellied Sapsucker. In 1981, the Yellowbellied Sapsucker had not been split into the Red-breasted and Red-naped. If he had observed the Red-breasted, then all four participants would have seen that species. The total for all would then be 243 species, and one less additional species for each.

#### FIELD TRIP REPORT

## Sonoma Coast and Owling at Willow Creek

The bird of the day was the adult Bald Eagle that slowly soared past just above Bridgehaven. The bird of the evening was a Spotted Owl that perched nearby and called while we were watching. Nine species of raptors were seen on this trip led by Dan Nelson.


