#### FIELD TRIP REPORT

## Bodega Bay and Salmon Creek

On a mild March 17th, 16 birders found 94 species of birds, plus 4 additional seen on the way home. Three Spotted Owls on a ridge near Salmon Creek answered Doug Ellis' calls in mid-afternoon. The mammal of the day was a Sea Otter that slowly floated past Bodega Head. This was a life mammal in Sonoma County for Dan Nelson, leader of the trip, and for other members of the group. Loons and grebes were beginning to change into breeding plumage. The Oldsquaw was not seen, so perhaps had gone.
