May 12, Saturday - Field Trip to Ida Clayton Road

Time: 7:30 a.m.

Meeting Place: Junction of Hwy 128 and Ida Clayton Rd., about 6½ miles N. of Calistoga

Ida Clayton Road goes from mixed deciduous forest, oak woodland and chaparral on the north west side of Mt. St. Helena. With this varied habitat, we may expect to see a large number of species. Mike Parmeter, leader, lists the rarities that are seen some years on page 86 of Birds of Sonoma

County. As there are limited parking areas along the road, please plan to carpool. Reminder: do bring lunch as there are no restaurants.

FIELD TRIP REPORT

King Ridge Road

Doug Ellis, leader, called out Pygmy Owls at 2 locations, and 2 others were heard. The American Dipper posed on the edge of Austin Creek, and another wish bird of the day, the Pileated Woodpecker, was almost abundant and ubiquitous. At least 4 were seen, and 5 others heard, a total of 9 for the day. Six Blue Grouse were heard, and one was clearly seen. The weather was overcast and cool early; later the group enjoyed an ideal spring day.
