DEADLINE: December 26th for January Kite Tales.

The Wood Stork is a rare post-breeding migrant in Northen California, and had never been seen in Sonoma County until this fall. One was sighted in the Delta in October, and Jean Richmond reported seeing it at Seven Mile Slough, Sacramento County, on October 26th. On October 30th, Stephen Brown, an employee of the Santa Rosa Water Reclamation Department, noticed a very strange-looking bird among the herons and egrets at the Brown Farm pond on Llano Road. Luckily, that very same day, John McDonagh, Avis Anderson, Betty Groce, and Jack Troutfetter were there compiling a list of the birds at the city's sewer ponds. Avis spotted the bird, and Betty identified it. That afternoon, John reported the sighting to Bob Rains, who activated the telephone wheel. Don Johnston took the first Sonoma County photograph of the bird that day. About a dozen of our members saw the Stork at the pond on October 30th and November 1st. It then left the pond, but Dan Nelson found the bird few days later at the Laguna de Santa Rosa behind the Sebastopol Community Center. It has been seen by many birders along the Laguna above and below Highway 12, with the last reported sighting on November 25th.

FIELD TRIP REPORT Bodega Bay and Sebastopol - November 10

On a calm, warm, fall day at the Coast, thirteen birders, led by Dan Nelson and Ruth Rudesill, enjoyed 108 species. The bird of the day was the Wood Stork, found near the Community Center in Sebastopol. There were 2 male Eurasian Wigeons at Bodega Bay, and a Ring-necked Duck that was appeared to be a hybrid. Four Alcid species were seen with an unusually high number of Cassin's Auklets, eight, and two Ancient Murrelets. Species seen only on the Sebastopol extension are preceded by an asterisk in the following list.
