

Horned Owls there. Early birders may meet at the Rail Ponds at 2:00 p.m. for an afternoon at Bodega Bay. For those meeting at the Bodega Cemetery, the cemetery is just past the town of Bodega on the right side of the highway at the top of the hill before

the junction to Hwy 1.

April 6, Saturday - Field Trip to King Ridge Road

FIELD TRIP REPORT

Russian River - Duncan's Mills to Bridgehaven

Cold, blustery weather limited the birds seen on this trip led by Ruth Rudesill. Even so, the 13 participants spent much of the time watching raptors; a subadult Bald Eagle soaring with a Ferruginous Hawk, 2 Red-tails, a Northern Harrier and a Kestrel. The hard-core birders who stayed after some had left were rewarded with a flock of Evening Grosbeaks up Willow Creek.

Good News and Bad News

Eurasian Wigeon are in greater numbers this year. Golden Eagles have been seen more frequently, and often more than one at a time. White-throated and Fox Sparrows continue to feed in yards. Anna's Hummingbirds are absent or in reduced numbers at several feeders where they had been abundant.
