May 11, Saturday - Field Trip to Ida Clayton Road

Time: 7:30 a.m.

Meeting Place: Junction of Hwy. 128 and Ida Clayton Rd., about 6½ miles W. of Calistoga

Dan Nelson will lead this trip, a combined RROS and Madrone Audubon Society field trip. The road climbs from Knight's Valley up the north west side of Mt. St. Helena. We start with mixed woodland habitat on up to chapparal where the Sage Sparrow was found last year. Mountain

Quail and Wild Turkey were also seen. Bring lunch and hope that the MacGillivray's Warbler greets us while we feast. The road has few turnouts, so please plan to carpool.

May 25-27, Saturday - Monday: Field Trip to Lava Beds

Ruth Rudesill will lead this trip to Lave Beds National Monument and Tule Lake. On the trip 2 years ago, these birds were seen: White-faced Ibis, Sandhill Crane, Yellow-headed Blackbird, Black Tern, Short-eared Owl, Mountain Bluebird, Brewer's Sparrow, and Prairie Falcon. June 15,16, Saturday, Sunday - Field Trip to Yosemite

APRIL FIELD TRIP REPORT King Ridge Road

We missed our leader, Ruth Rudesill, however, Doug Ellis filled in and and found all four of the wish birds: American Dipper, Northern Pygmy Owl, Blue Grouse and Pileated Woodpecker. The trip started at the Austin Creek Bridge, where there were swallows, warblers, ducks, then on to Cazadero for the dipper. Showers had been predicted, the group was rewarded with cool overcast early, turning into a mild day with clear, blue skies. While the total number of birds was low, the number of sought-after species was excellent. The Blue Grouse and Nashville Warbler were heard, but not seen. The Pygmy Owl at the Gualala River Bridge responded aggressively to Doug's call and came close in on a low branch. A pair of Ospreys was seen on a nest at Kruse Rhododendron Preserve. Gulls and cormorants were spotted at Jenner on the way home.
