COMING ATTRACTIONS

Potluck and General Meeting: May 14--Thursday, 6:00 PM

Place: Sugarloaf State Park

There will be a short business meeting after the Potluck dinner. Bring your own service, drinks and a main dish, salad or dessert. Field Trip: Saturday, May 16, 1992, to Pine Flat Road. Meet just up the road from the confluence of Hwy 128 and Pine Flat Road in Alexander Valley at 7:30 AM. Dan Nelson will lead. You may call him at 762-6152.

Field Trip: Sunday, June 7, 1992, to Sonoma Developmental Center grounds. Meet at Sonoma Valley Regional Park just off Hwy 12 near Glen Ellen at 7:30 AM. Cindy Young will lead.

Field Trip: A rather ambitious trip is planned for the weekend of July 10-12 to the Nature Conservancy Preserve on the Kern River in Kern County northwest of Bakersfield. A group including your field trips chairperson is planning on driving down Friday, and they will meet at the preserve headquarters at 7:00 AM on Saturday, July 11. Preserve personnel will escort any takers to see the Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Willow Flycatchers, and other birds that nest there. The recommended route is Hwy 178 toward Lake Isabella from Bakersfield, 50+ miles extent. Accom-

odations are available in the Lake Isabella area. The turnoff to the preserve entrance is located 1.1 miles beyond the Kernville airport. Call Cindy Young for more information at 585-8826.

FIELD TRIP REPORTS

Report of field trip to Clear Lake area, March 28, 1992 Fifteen intrepid birders, led by Les Hood, visited Anderson Marsh, Boggs Lake and various Clear Lake sites including the Lake County land fill. Highlights were: a Golden Eagle harassed by ravens at the land fill, and a rufous-crowned sparrow singing as participants watched the eagle. The weather was clear and warm, but it was a little early for most migrants. Report of field trip to Bodega Bay area, April 4. Despite increasingly strong winds, 15 birders enjoyed the day of birding at Bodega Harbor and Salmon Creek Road. Best birds of the day were: (1) Female Steller's Eider at the boat launch ramp at West Side Park--now present since late October 1991; (2) A winter male Oldsquaw in the channel near the turn up to Bodega Head allowing close and leisurely observation; (3) An adult male Eurasian Wigeon at the farm pond east of the town of Bodega. Many spring migrants had arrived along Salmon Creek Road and most were singing. A single immature Brown Pelican at Bodega Head was unseasonable. There were an estimated 400 Brant present in the harbor. Lunch was eaten at Doran Park behind a wind break which provided some relief from blowing sand. Martin R. Weil of Argentina was our guest throughout the day. BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

The budget committee composed of Jean Smith, Clarence Wolcott and Bertha Rains submitted a budget at the last meeting. An increase in dues was included in the budget, and some of the details submitted to the editor follow. The increase was approved at the April meeting. Proposed budget:

The increase in dues is included in this budget: Family, \$15 (from \$10), Individual, \$8 (from \$7.50), and student \$3 (unchanged). Income from dues has fluctuated in the past few years. Change from yearly beginning balance to ending balance has also fluctuated, with a loss for the past year of an estimated \$420. There are only a few books left to sell. An increase in dues is necessary in order to produce sufficient funds to meet basic expenses. The committee recommendations will be printed (along with a financial report) in the next Kite Tales. Dues are for fiscal year (July 1-June 30), and the treasurer will be available at the May meeting for payment. Note that dues and most welcome **contributions** are tax deductible.
