

COMING ATTRACTIONS

General Meeting: Thursday April 8, 1993. Place: Darwin Hall, Sonoma State University Time: 7:30 PM. The featured speakers will be Bob and Bertha Rains who birded Trinidad and Tobago during this past Christmas season and will show us slides and tell of their adventures.

Field Trip: Saturday, April 24, 1993 to Ida Clayton Road. Meet at the intersection of Ida Clayton Rd and State Hwy 128 at 8:00 AM. Bring a lunch, and we will look for Spring birds and flowers. Ruth Rudesill will lead.

Field Trip: Saturday, May 15, 1993 to Pine Flat Rd. Meet at the turnout about 1/4 mile up Pine Flat Rd (same as last year). Take Alexander Rd from US 101 at Healdsburg, then SR 128 to Pine Flat Rd. We will look again for Black-chinned Sparrow, found last year, and other chaparral species. Leader will be Dan Nelson.

Field Trips: A Memorial Day weekend, May 28 to May 31, overnight trip is planned to Arcata and Humboldt Co. Some will be leaving Friday afternoon and returning Monday, but others may join on Saturday or Sunday. The plan is to camp at Patrick's Pt. State Park. More details will be printed in the May Kite Tales. Also planned is a June trip to the Central Valley, and a July 4th weekend trip to the Tulelake/Lava Beds area.

FIELD TRIP REPORTS

The field trip of Sunday, March 14, to Bodega Bay produced 89 species. 15 participants turned out on an overcast day with periods of light drizzle, but a warm and calm sea with a minus tide. Highlights of the day were a

breeding plumaged Red-necked Grebe, three calling **Black Rails** at Doran Park, several breeding plumaged Common Loons, and about 400(+) Brant.

FIELD TRIP REPORTS, continued

The field trip to Maricopa, Kern County area on March 20-21 produced outstanding birds as reported by Ruth Rudesill.

Participants on the count included: Betty Groce, David Hofmann, Linda Petrulias, Ruth Rudesill, Jean Smith, Alan Wight and Cindy Young. The weather was sunny and warm with large fields of green grass and wildflowers to make the drive down I-5 enjoyable.

At Kern NWR hundreds of duck and thousands of sandpipers were seen, and everyone was thrilled by several Greater Roadrunners. In the evening Lesser Nighthawks were noted, along with a hovering Burrowing Owl and a Short-eared Owl (rare for the area). Early spring migrants were also noted at Kern including Western Kingbird, Northern Oriole and Lesser Yellowlegs.

Sunday, March 21, began with overcast skies and anxious birders at an oilfield outside the town of Maricopa. As they exited their cars, the target bird called. A tape was played and birders were rewarded with an extended close view of the LeConte's Thrasher (lifer for five of the seven participants). Later on as the birders entered the Tehachapi Mountains toward Mt. Pinos, they stopped at a field of flowers that were frequented by a large flock of finches. Another target species was found, Lawrence's Goldfinch.

David Hofmann celebrated lifers #597 and #598 with a banana split for lunch and Denny's "Chocolante Challenge" for dinner. Question: When will Betty Groce celebrate with her next lifer, #600? It had better be a very good bird, Betty!

Space and time (the editor was away until April 1; hence the late Kite Tales) will not permit a complete listing of all of the birds noted (115 species according to Ruth). However, the following should be of interest to those who did not go. Golden Eagle, Prairie Falcon, Chukar (heard), Mt. Quail (heard), Lesser Yellowlegs, Greater Roadrunner, Barn Owl, Short-eared Owl, Burrowing Owl, Lesser Nighthawk, Costa's Hummingbird, Whiteheaded Woodpecker, 5 species of swallows, Clark's Nutcracker (and 5 additional corvids), Mt. Chickadee, all three nuthatches, Rock Wren, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, California and LeConte's Thrashers, six species of sparrows

including Sage and Lincoln, six icterids including Yellow-headed Blackbird and Northern Oriole, and four finches including Lawrence's Goldfinch and Purple finch.

ADDITIONAL NEWS AND TRIVIA

The nominating committee composed of three very capable and loyal attendees, Barbara Gumtow, Winnie Nelson and Bertha Rains, presented their report at the March meeting.
