

Coming Attractions

Potluck Dinner and General Meeting. September 9, 1993 – Thursday, 6:00 PM at Sugarloaf State Park. There will be a short business meeting after the potluck dinner. Field Trip to Healdsburg for Vaux's Swift Fly-In. Friday, September 10. Meet in Healdsburg at 6:45 PM (evening) to hopefully see large numbers of migrating Vaux's Swifts fly in to roost in a large chimney. Directions: drive north on 101 to Healdsburg, take the Healdsburg Avenue exit and turn right on Healdsburg Avenue, turn right on Ballhache Road and drive 3.5 miles to Rio Lindo Academy (Ballhache Road becomes Rio Lindo Road), drive through gates to stop sign, turn left at sign, drive 1.5 blocks, turn right, drive toward tall building on left with large metal chimney, park here along road. From The President

The Southwestern Willow Flycatcher (Empidonax trailili extimus) was recommended for Federal Listing by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service on April 30, 1993. This subspecies occurs in riparian habitats of the southwest from southeastern California, east to western Texas and south to northern Baja California. Although the A.O.U. Checklist (1957 5th edition) does not recognize this subspecies, it is widely regarded as a valid subspecies. If listed, this species could play a significant role in protecting our remaining desert riparian habitats. There are several other species that are set to follow the Southwestern Willow Flycatcher in the listing process that may completely alter the uses of riparian water resources in the southwest in the years to come. Field Trip Reports

Humboldt County, May 28-31, 1993.

A wet and wild weekend! Saturday was hot and humid with the rain starting in the late afternoon and ending (briefly) Monday morning. And most people stayed until Monday! Despite the rain, Patrick's Point is still beautiful and had a lot of birds (David had his breakfast sausage snatched by a bold Steller's Jay!). A total of 108 bird species were recorded.

Highlights included:

Watching 10,000+ Common Murres on offshore rocks with a half dozen Tufted Puffins. Also, Rhinoceros Auklets and Marbled Murrelets!

Eating at Samoa Cookhouse!

An Eastern Kingbird in Blue Lake!

A Blue-winged Teal at Arcata Marsh!

Lodi Area/Consumnes River Preserve, June 19, 1993.

Weather was hot (96°F) with a slight delta breeze. We arrived early at Consumnes River Preserve (on Twin Cities Road, off I-5) which is a riparian area. We saw at least 5 and heard several more Blue Grosbeaks, but missed Swainson's Hawk. The best birds of the day were a pair of Indigo Buntings on Woodbridge Road, San Joaquin County (first county record). A total of 52 bird species were recorded. Participants were Avis Andersen, David Hofmann, John and Virginia McDonagh, Linda Petrulias, and Ruth Rudesill.

Lava Beds/Klamath Basin, July 3-5, 1993.

We had a fabulous weekend blessed with great weather! The group camped at Lava Beds National Monument; birded the area including Lower Klamath NWR, Fort Klamath, and Crater Lake. Several of us also stopped at Fall River Mills and Burney Falls State Park on the way home. A total of 143 bird species were recorded. Highlights included: Franklin's Gull, White-faced Ibis, and Swainson's Hawk at Lower Klamath; five Prairie Falcons at Petroglyph Rock; Common Nighthawks (in courtship flights) and Pinyon Jays at Lava Beds: Gray Flycatchers on a nest at Mammoth Crater; Gray Jays, a Red-naped Sapsucker, and Doug called in a Northern Pygmy-Owl at Crater Lake NP. Bank Swallows at Fall River Mills and Black Swifts at Burney Falls SP. And we spent nearly an hour listening to a calling Yellow Rail at Fort Klamath, Oregon. Mammals seen during the trip were Mule Deer, Black-tailed Jackrabbit, Pronghorn Antelope, California Kangaroo Rat, Coyote, Yellow Pine Chipmunk, Chickaree, Golden-mantled Ground Squirrel, Belding Ground Squirrel, Montane Vole, Western Gray Squirrel, Yellow-bellied Marmot, and Nuttall's Cottontall.
