

#### Sonoma County Breeding Bird Atlas

The Sonoma County Breeding Bird Atlas still lives. Work is now progressing on species accounts. Many RROS members are acting as authors, and have already received instructions and assignments for writing accounts for selected birds.

Anyone feel left out? Contact Betty and she will provide you with material to work with to write these accounts.

Also needed are confirmed records of the following birds breeding in Sonoma County from any year, not just our atlas period 1986-91. The birds are: Blue-winged Teal, American Wigeon, Blue Grouse, Black Rail, Clapper Rail, Band-tailed Pigeon, Common Nighthawk, Common Poorwill, Bank Swallow, Rock Wren, Canyon Wren, MacGillivray's Warbler, Yellow-breasted Chat, American Bittern, Sora, Tufted Puffin, Rhinoceros Auklet, Nashville Warbler, Black-chinned Sparrow, Red Crossbill, Greater Roadrunner, Longeared Owl. Short-eared Owl.

The atlas also needs secretarial help. Specifically someone with an IBM compatible computer at home (and Word Perfect), to enter the species accounts onto disks. The pay scale is humiliating, but the appreciation of the Atlas Committee will be overwhelming.

Incidentally, last, but certainly not least, The Marin County BBA is now available from Bushtit Books, Box 233, Bolinas, CA 94924. Price plus tax is \$26.76. (Bob and Bertha Rains will pick them up for you.) Or

add \$3.50 for postage and handling. This is a monumental volume which shall certainly become a standard reference work on the breeding status of Marin (and Sonoma) County birds.
