Field Trip Report

Point Reyes National Seashore Sept. 23, 1995

If you ever wanted to be on a great field trip where rare vagrants were being found throughout the day, this was the one field trip to be on. There were 22 birders that met at Whitehouse Pool County Park at 7:30 AM. Our trip leader, Mike Parmeter, led us out to the Mendosa Ranch where a male Cape May Warbler had been seen the day before. It was there along with a young male American Redstart. Next came the lighthouse, where a Least Flycatcher was found behind the apartments. At the Fish Docks were 2 to 3 Blackpoll Warblers and a Black and White Warbler. Lunch was planned at Drake's Beach, but not before everyone enjoyed the Black-throated Blue Warbler and Chestnut-sided Warbler present in the trees above the monument. Then it was learned that an Ovenbird had been found at the Fish Docks, so back we went. With a little patience it was located and seen by almost everyone that was still with us. One of our group even heard a Red-throated Pipit fly over at the Fish Docks. The "outer point" total for the day was 77 species.

Almost news:

Through the birding grapevine it has been learned that at the recent AOU meeting certain species splits were agreed to: the Scrub Jay will become 4 separate species; Florida Jay, Woodhouse Jay, Santa Cruz Jay, & Scrub Jay. The Solitary Vireo will become 3 (?) species: Solitary Vireo, Cassin's Vireo and Plumbeus Vireo. Rufous-sided Towhee will become Spotted Towhee (western) and Rufous-sided Towhee (eastern). The Sharp-tailed Sparrow will split into 2 species, Nelson's Sparrow (western) and Sharp-tailed Sparrow (eastern). And last but not least the Northern Oriole will go back to Baltimore Oriole and Bullock's Oriole. This will probably be made public next year. None of the above is "official" yet, so don't add anything to your lists just yet!!

Lanceolated Warbler Spotted on Farallon Islands

First Sighting Ever in North America

What is believed to have been a Lanceolated Warbler (Loustella lanceolata) was spotted on Southeast Farallon Island by Point Reyes Bird Observatory biologists on September 11, 1995. This species breeds in northern Russia, including western Siberia, and winters in Southeast Asia. It's occurrence on the island represents the first recorded sighting in North America apart from a handful of sightings on the Aleutian Islands in Alaska. The bird was caught in a mist net which was set up by the Bird Observatory biologists as part of their routine bird banding operations. The warbler was banded, measured, photographed, and released. It was seen on the island the following day, but evidently departed the night of the 12th.

The Lanceolated Warbler is a member of a genus that includes several difficult-to-identify species, including the grasshopper warblers of Eurasia. It is a showcase example of a "little brown bird", a generic term for birds possessing few plumage features that readily distinguish it. All measurements, including relative distances between primary tips, fit the specifications for the Lanceolated Warbler. However, positive identification by comparing the photographs with museum specimens is still needed to confirm the sighting.

The Lanceolated Warbler is notorious as a "skulker", a bird that spends its time hidden in thick ground-level vegetation. It is often compared to a mouse, glimpsed only while scurrying through an opening in the grass. Thus, it is a bird that could be a more frequent visitor to North America than presumed. 
