#### Lake Hennessey, February 10, 1996

Seventeen birders were out this beautiful spring day with temperatures in the 70 degree range. Of the sixty-four species of birds seen, the highlights were the male Eurasian Wigeon, an adult Bald Eagle, a Pygmy Owl, a calling Pileated Woodpecker, the returning Tree Swallows, the Rock Wren, and a White-throated Sparrow.

## Field Trip Report

#### Tule Lake/Klamath Basin Area February 17 to 19.

We were lucky with the weather (especially on Saturday) as it did not rain on us until the evenings of both Saturday and Sunday. There was very little snow on the ground and therefore lots of flooded fields for the waterfowl.

We spent Saturday at Lower Klamath and Tule Lake National Wildlife Refuge as well as driving through the northern edge of Lava Beds National Monument. It was actually sunny (and windy) most of the day. Highlights included: dark-phased Rough-legged and Ferruginous Hawks; a pair of Coyotes; a male Hooded Merganser; several male Eurasian Wigeon; a very out of place White-throated Swift on Hill Road; Prairie Falcons (3) at Petroglyph Cliffs; and an immature Northern Shrike at Captain Jack's Stronghold.

#### Tule Lake/Klamath Basin Area February 17 to 19. cont'd

Sunday was cloudy and cool, and we spent the entire day in Oregon at local parks in Klamath Falls. Moore Park had fresh Mountain Lion tracks. We saw lots of winter and mountain birds. Highlights included: an Orange-crowned Warbler at Veteran's Park; great looks at Barrow's Goldeneye on the Link River; and flocks of hundreds of American Robins and Cedar Waxwings feeding on Western Juniper berries (unfortunately a Bohemian Waxwing sighted by one of us could not be relocated in the flocks).

Monday was a little unsettled but we enjoyed thousands of geese and nearly a hundred Bald Eagles. On the way home, several of us observed a small flock of Pinyon Javs at the Lava Beds.-----Ruth Rudesill
