COMING ATTRACTIONS

General Meeting. Thursday, March 13. Darwin Hall, Room 221. Sonoma State University at 7:30 PM. The program will be presented by Gary Page, director of Coastal and Esturarine Research at PRBO. He has conducted the Pacific Flyway Study that involved the spring and fall census of shorebirds in San Francisco Bay. He has studied Snowy Plovers for over 25 years, and he has been a leader in obtaining endangered status for the Snowy Plover. He will present progress on the study of the use of barriers to protect Snowy Plover nests from Ravens and other predators.

General Meeting. Thursday, April 10. Darwin Hall, Room 221. Sonoma State University at 7:30 PM. See the April Kite Tales for details regarding the program.

Field Trip to Bodega Bay/Salmon Creek Road. Saturday, March 15. We will meet at 8:00 AM in front of the "rail ponds" in Bodega Bay. There will be plenty of birds to see at this time of year at this always exciting area in Sonoma County. Bodega Bay combined with Salmon Creek Road will give us a wide range of habitats to bird during the beginning of the spring migration. Benjamin D. "Mike" Parmeter will be the leader for this trip.

Field Trip to Mitchell Canyon/Contra Costa County. Saturday, April 19. We will meet at the Mitchell Canyon trailhead parking lot at 8:30 AM. Mitchell Canyon is located on the north side of Mt. Diablo. To get there take 680 to Walnut Creek and exit on Ygnacio Valley Road east. (During the past couple of years because of freeway construction in the Walnut Creek area it has been necessary to take the Livorna Road exit further south and come back on the northbound lanes to turn onto Ygnacio Valley Road.) Go 7.7 miles and turn south on Clayton Road. Go 1 mile and turn right onto Mitchell Canyon Road. The trailhead parking lot is at the end of this road. There is a small parking fee. Bring lunch and water. The leader is Alan Wight. For further details or changes see the April Kite Tales.

Field Trip Report

Tule Lake NWR/Klamath Basin, February 15-17, 1997

We had a fabulous trip up to the Klamath Basin! The weather was exceptionally good (tee-shirt warm on Saturday; cool and partially cloudy the last two days) and we had practically no rain/snow. Snow level was high and there was lots of water around. We even drove up to Crater Lake! On Saturday evening, we were blessed with one of the most beautiful sunsets ever seen with the orange-pink clouds over Mt. Shasta and silhouetted flying geese.

The birds were very cooperative - we had 112 species. And we saw some good ones - an adult Northern Shrike along Hill Road in Tule Lake NWR; several Eurasian Wigeon at both refuges; 111 Bald Eagles (thanks to Rick for keeping count!); 6 Golden Eagles; 6 Prairie Falcons; an adult Northern Goshawk at Upper Klamath (seen by only a few unfortunately); four species of owls (thanks to Doug for the Great Gray and Great Horned Owls calling at Ft. Klamath!); 100,000+ geese and swans in flocks of thousands; and the best bird was the last one seen - at least three Bohemian Waxwings with a flock of Cedar Waxwings at the Lava Beds campground!
