

COMING ATTRACTIONS

General Meeting. Thursday, April 10. Darwin Hall, Room 221. Sonoma State University at 7:30 PM. The program will be given by Mike Parmeter on a birding trip to Columbia. Mike has traveled worldwide in his search for birds. Among his many accomplishments, he co-authored "Birds of Sonoma County California".

General Meeting. Thursday, May 15. Sugarloaf Ridge State Park at 6:00 PM. We will meet at the Group Campground (end of the road past the stables). The potluck dinner will begin at 6:00 PM, followed by the short business meeting, and then the owl/poorwill walk. Comfortable shoes, a warm coat, and a flashlight are recommended if you wish to go on the owl/poorwill walk. The parking fee is \$5.00 per vehicle, so carpool if you can. Note the change of meeting date from 2nd Thursday to 3rd Thursday of the month.

Field Trip to Mitchell Canyon/Contra Costa County. Saturday, April 19. We will meet at the Mitchell Canyon trailhead parking lot at 8:30 AM. Mitchell Canyon is located on the north side of Mt. Diablo. To get there take 680 to Walnut Creek and exit on Ygnacio Valley Road east. (During the past couple of years because of freeway construction in the Walnut Creek area it has been necessary to take the Livorna Road exit farther south and come back on the northbound lanes to turn onto Ygnacio Valley Road.) Go 7.7 miles and turn south on Clayton Road. Go 1 mile and turn right onto Mitchell Canyon Road. The trailhead parking lot is at the end of this road. There is a small parking fee. Bring lunch and water. The leader is Alan Wight.

Field Trip to Pine Flat Road. Saturday, May 17. We will meet at the first bridge on Pine Flat Road off Hwy 129. Details will be in the May Kite Tales.

DOES THE MANDARIN DUCK COUNT

The Mandarin Duck, a native of Asia, is one of the flashiest ducks in the world. It is not necessary to make a trip to Japan or China to see this bird however, for some have been released or escaped from zoos or private collections and are living in the wild in Sonoma County. The town of Sonoma and the area about Chalk Hill Road near Healdsburg are locations where their presence has been reported in the "Sonoma County Breeding Bird Atlas."

This is not entirely good news, for as we humans have learned from the ill-advised introductions of the European Starling, House Sparrow, and Rock Dove, native species can suffer and the balance of nature can be upset by the intrusion of these newcomers. The Mandarin Duck is a close relative of the Wood Duck and may well place significant competitive pressures on that and other native species.

Before any judgments are made, data must first be gathered to determine the status and viability of this new population.

The American Ornithological Union (AOU) which, among other duties, monitors bird populations has contacted RROS member Betty Burridge for information on this bird. The AOU wants to make a determination whether to list the Mandarin Duck as an introduced species with a viable population living in the wild without human assistance, but they need more information.

How RROS members can help!

Please write a brief report on any Mandarin Duck sightings starting immediately. Include your name and address, the date and time of the sighting, the number of adult birds by gender, the number of young, the exact location, and what the birds were doing. Especially note breeding behaviors, and nest box use versus use of natural holes in trees. Records from previous years are also sought.
