

COMING ATTRACTIONS

Field Trip Report

Mitchell Canyon/Contra Costa County, April 19, 1997

Thirteen birders made their way up this lovely canyon for a nice day of birds, plants, and butterflies. The number and variety of migrant birds in the canyon was less this year than in previous years, but we still managed to find many "spring" birds. The highlights of the day were two Nashville Warblers, two adult Golden Eagles, one male Rufous Hummingbird, and a heard-only Sage Sparrow. Fifty-three species of birds were encountered. This canyon is a great place to see butterflies. The butterflies that we saw follow:
