FIELD TRIPS

Saturday April 18th Field Trip to Mitchell Canyon, Contra Costa County on the slope of Mt. Diablo. Meet at the parking lot at 9:00 am (there is a small fee.) Take Hwy 680 south to Walnut Creek. Take the Ygnacio Valley Road exit East. Once on Ygnacio Vlly Rd travel 7.7 miles and turn south on to Clayton Rd. Go 1 mile and turn right on to Mitchell Canyon Rd. Follow this road to the end (1.6 miles.) This area is known for its wonderful wildflowers, butterflies, reptiles, and unusual migrant birds. Bring hiking shoes, water, and a lunch. Memorial Day Weekend May 23-25 Trip to Sierra Valley and Cottonwood Creek?? Memorial Day weekend is proposed for this potentially great birding adventure. Cottonwood Creek (national Forest) Campground (6000 ft elevation), 25 miles north of Truckee on Hwy 89 has a beautiful group campground is enough participants can be enlisted. All of the spring Sierra birds and wild flowers can be found right on the creek and wonderful scenic hiking opportunities start at the campground. Sierra Valley (5000 ft) high nesting wetland for Sandhill Cranes, Common Snipe, White-faced Ibis, Black terns, Willets, Bitterns, Avocets, rails, and ducks is a few miles away. Swainson's Hawks, Sage Thrashers, and Burrowing Owls nest in the uplands. Common Nighthawks may be at the campground.

Travel time: 3 ½ hours from Santa Rosa. It has been known to rain or snow on this weekend and the temperatures can range into the high 70's Great Campfires are guaranteed and all participants are asked to contribute ingredients for S'mores. We need to have payment in advance to reserve the group site. Cost may be about \$20/person to cover the campground rental fee. May 1st is the deadline to reserve this group site so if at least 20 people have not signed up by then the trip will be cancelled. The more, the merrier and the cheaper. FIELD TRIP REPORT by Ruth Rudesill

March 14-15th trip to the Sage Grouse Lek near Susanville, Lassen County

We had an extremely successful trip to Lassen County! Rick LeBaudour and Richard Merriss drove up the night before and spent all day Saturday birding and found 93 species in Lassen County from Eagle Lake to Honey Lake. Ned Wynn and I arrived Saturday afternoon and found 2 Northern Shrikes in the Honey Lake area as well as a Bald Eagle perched right over the road. We were lucky with the weather – sunny and warm. On Sunday morning we all got up very early drove to the lek with Rick's 4-wheel drive truck (no long hike!) It was still dark and we could hear the grouse already booming. In the light (after a beautiful sunrise) we saw a total of 10 males, 1 male who was not displaying—but still had the hen's attention, and 6-8 hens. Later in the day, Rick and Richard decided to head to Pyramid Lake in Nevada. Ned and I birded Janesville for the Lewis' Woodpecker and then followed them to Pyramid Lake. This was not a very birdy trip but was interesting country. We saw a Golden Eagle on the road, Rick and Richard had Prairie Falcons and we saw Sage Sparrows at several stops. At the lake, Rick and Richard saw the pelicans, some grebes, but few ducks. See complete list below:
