## Field Trip Report

#### Southeastern Arizona - August 7th - 9th 1998 - by Ruth Rudesill

Five participants were: Doug Ellis, Len and Lynn Gearhart(from Wilsonville, Oregon), Linda Petrulias and me. We were blessed with pretty good weather - warm with afternoon showers, including hail on Mt. Lemmon. Until the last afternoon the rain didn't keep us from the field. Everyone got lifebirds and Doug saw many new butterflies, but we also had bad luck on some of the target birds. The first afternoon we were near the Sonoran Desert Museum where Doug had scouted a family of Varied Buntings - mom, pop, and two fledglings. Then we drove up Mt. Lemmon where we stopped at different lifezones for a variety of birds.

Our second day we traveled from the Santa Rita grasslands sighting a variety of sparrows and a Goshawk flew out of the canyon to capture a bird. We drove to the Patagonia area and saw birds at the famed rest stop, including a Violetcrowned Hummingbird and nest (which Linda spotted) and Gray Hawks. Unfortunately the Becard eluded us but we saw two nests. After lunch we traveled to the Patons backyard in Patagonia which borders the preserve. It is wonderful how these people open their yard for birders to sit and watch the feeders. We saw a variety of hummers there but none of the truly rare ones we were hoping for. The we went on toe Kino Springs for Black-bellied Whistling Duck

and what was probably the best bird of the trip-a Green Kingfisher! We continued to a spot where Doug had seen a Buff-collared Nightjar on the road a few nights earlier; he was able to drive up to it. We had one set of orangish eyes shine that might have been the bird but the road had a lot of traffic and no other nightjars were seen although Poorwill were calling all over. Back at Madera Canyon, Doug easily called the Whiskered Screech Owl and he had good luck hearing the rare Arizona Spotted Owl.

The third morning we concentrated on the Santa Rita grasslands and Florida Wash area where we saw more sparrows and a variety of birds. Then moving up into the canyon, we hiked looking for the Trogons but were unable to locate them. We did find Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher and Painted Redstart. At the Santa Rita Lodge we watched the many hummingbird feeders for a while and saw numerous species but the rare ones eluded us. (Berylline reportedly showed up after we left.) I witnessed an amazing sight: there were Acorn Woodpeckers in the area and the hummers were buzzing and the birds. One hummer, a Broad-billed I believe, buzzed a passing Acorn Woodpecker. The woodpecker turned in midair and caught the hummer like a big bug! It flew to a nearby oak and whacked the poor hummer against the trunk and then flew off.
