Survey of Trumpeter Swans Wintering in California

The Trumpeter Swan Society (TTSS) will attempt to document Trumpeter swans wintering in California. TTSS knows that at least 50 and perhaps as many as 200 Trumpeters winter in California and suspects that most of the birds winter from the Sacramento Delta north, to as far South as the Owens Valley and Death Valley.

TTSS is asking for help to conduct this survey. Contact Rod Hug (address below), or Liz Cook for Yolo County < lcook@water.ca.gov >, if you can help. TTSS believes that marked Trumpeters may include birds released at Summer Lake, Oregon in 1991-1995, as well as migrants from Canadian flocks in North West Territory and Alberta. Some of the unmarked birds may also be coming south from Alaska.

Birders please record the following information:

- A. Color and number of birds, singles or family groups, mixed or not mixed with Tundra swans. (Note: Immature Trumpeters are gray, and mature Trumpeters are white. Trumpeters might be found as singles or family groups mixed with large numbers of Tundra swans.)
- **B.** Neck collar color and markings, make a sketch if possible. (Note: Collars are green with white codes that usually are read from the body toward the head. A few collars are red with white codes, and a few are yellow with black codes. Probably less than 10% will have neck collars.)
- C. What characteristics caused you to identify these birds as Trumpeters rather than Tundra swans? Did you hear them call? (Note: The Trumpeter head is somewhat distinctive if viewed a close range. However, the call of the Trumpeter is diagnostic. But groups of Trumpeters often remain silent for long periods.)
- **D.** Activity; i.e., resting, feeding on pond, field, or flying.
- E. Take photos if you can.

Other pertinent information: date(s), location, name, phone number and e-mail address of observer (report as soon as possible after observation is made).

Good Birding Spots #3

Shollenberger Park by Betty Burridge

One of Sonoma County's best kept secrets, from the birder's point of view, is Shollenberger Park in south-eastern Petaluma. Not a lawn-and-tree kind of a place, this is a well protected wetland bordered in part by Adobe Creek and the Petaluma River. This park has a variety of diked ponds, ample marsh vegetation and open fields, level paths (some paved, some gravel) and a few benches and picnic tables. A loop trail extends 2 miles around the main dike. The park is owned and maintained by the City of Petaluma.

An astonishing variety of birds may be found here in every season. Large flocks of shorebirds and waterfowl arrive in fall and stay throughout the winter. In recent years a Burrowing Owl has also taken up winter residence here along with increased numbers of American Bitterns.

During breeding season, nests and young of American Avocets, Black-necked Stilts, Piedbilled Grebes, Common Moorhens, American Coots, Canada Geese, and Mallards can be fairly easily found. Rails, Common Yellowthroats, American Bitterns and Song Sparrows are more secretive in their breeding locations here.

Birder's will find that they share the trail with bicyclists, joggers, walkers, and dog owners. Fortunately the design of the park allows for relatively undisturbed pursuit of each of these healthful out-door activities. Note that no restrooms or drinking water are available.

Some twenty five years ago this was a seasonal wetland serving as an unimproved pasture for a few cattle, flood control for the overflow from the Petaluma River, and home or wintering area for many birds. Because of its location at the foot of Cader Lane, this wonderful wetland became known in the birding community as the Cader Lane Ponds and is referred to as such in the *Sonoma County Breeding Bird Atlas* published in 1995.

To reach Shollenberger Park from Hwy 101, go east on Lakeville Hwy. (Hwy.116 East) one mile to South McDowell Extension. Turn right (south) and proceed to the far side of the U. S. Postal Service Buildings. Turn right there at a tiny lane marked with a simple street sign, "City Park." This turn-off is at the foot of Cader Lane. Fifty yards down the primitive lane is a paved parking lot. The lane continues as a trail leading up onto the loop trail on the main dike.
