Good Birding Spots #5

Spring Lake Park by Mike Nelligan

Located in east Santa Rosa, Spring Lake was developed during the 1960s by the Sonoma County Water Agency as a flood control project. Created by a diversion of Santa Rosa Creek, the lake is about 20 acres while the park itself, including the lake, is approximately 314 acres.

Spring Lake Park is now operated as one of Sonoma County's Regional Parks and is open sunrise to sunset every day. Vehicular access is from Channel Drive just off Montgomery Drive or from Newanga Avenue, just off Summerfield Road. A visitor center is located inside the Channel Drive entry. A parking fee is charged at each entrance. Free access is provided by a 15 minute walk from the main parking lot for Howarth Park (lot next to Lake Ralphine) to Spring Lake. Besides the many trails, there are paved roads for driving, walking or bicycling over most of the park area.

Because of the varied topography, the bird sightings can be quite varied. The upland western portion is primarily oak woodland, and contains some stunted "pygmy" oaks. This area is home to 4 species of woodpeckers, White-breasted Nuthatches, Western Bluebirds, American and Lesser Goldfinches, along with other less frequently seen species. The opposite side of Spring Lake Park (east side) meets the hills of Annadel State Park and contains some conifers. Here, you may see Pileated Woodpeckers, various warblers and sparrows, and owls (more likely to be heard than seen). The lake itself hosts many water birds, both migratory and resident.

Spring Lake Park, like other "Good Birding Spots" changes over the years, so those birders familiar with how it is now may find interesting the following recapitulation of how it was December 18, 1983. This list is taken from the RROS Christmas Bird Count done by Hal Corey-Spring Lake, Lake Ralphine and environs:

Red-throated loon, Western Grebe, Pied-billed Grebe, Double-crested Cormorant, Great Blue

Heron, Green Heron, Great Egret, Snowy Egret, Mallard, Lesser Scaup, Common Goldeneye, Ruddy Duck, Turkey Vulture, Black-shouldered Kite, Red-shouldered Hawk, American Kestrel, California Quail, Virginia Rail, American Coot, Ring-billed Gull, Mourning Dove, Anna's Hummingbird, Belted Kingfisher, Common Flicker, Acorn Woodpecker, Nuttall's Woodpecker, Black Phoebe, Say's Phoebe, Scrub Jay, Common Crow, Chestnut-backed Chickadee, Plain Titmouse, Bushtit, Marsh Wren, Bewick's Wren, Northern Mockingbird, American Robin, Varied Thrush, Hermit Thrush, Western Bluebird, Golden-and Ruby-crowned Kinglets, Cedar Waxwing, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Brewer's Blackbird, Pine Siskin, Brown Towhee, Rufous-sided Towhee, Dark-eyed Junco, Whitecrowned Sparrow, Golden-crowned Sparrow, Fox Sparrow, Song Sparrow.

So try birding Spring Lake Park yourself and see how the list has changed over 15 years.

Santa Rosa Christmas Bird Count by Doug Ellis

On December 20th 1998, a dusting of snow greeted the 34 participants of the 39th Santa Rosa Christmas Bird Count. Despite the cold, the counters found 144 species and tallied a total of 28,717 birds. Highlights included a Common Loon, 88 White Pelicans, Greater White-fronted Goose, Snow Goose, Ross' Goose, two Eurasian Wigeon, an immature Bald Eagle, three Ferruginous Hawks, four Thayer's Gulls, 98 Tree Swallows, two Violet-green Swallows and two Blue-gray Gnatcatchers.

Field Trip Report - Pt. Reyes National Seashore, on January 10, 1999 by Ruth Rudesill

Eight birders ventured out on the cold but clear day to Marin County. Unfortunately, we were unable to go to the outer point as planned. The National Park Service has decided to have shuttle buses from Drakes Beach to Chimney Rock and Lighthouse only. We could not get permission to go to Spaletta Plateau. We did check out the Drakes Beach and Hall Ranch before going to Olema Marsh and over the ridge to Limantour Beach area. (It was warm at the beach!)

Highlights included: 3 Tundra Swans on Horseshoe Pond, good views of Horned Larks and a Cooper's Hawk at Hall Ranch, a pair of Hooded Mergansers at Olema Marsh, a very cooperative Yellowthroat at Limantour Beach and a Great Horned Owl at Muddy Hollow. Total species: 90. Ken and Becky saw a Bobcat at Pt Reyes. Some of us continued on to check Schollenberger Park in Petaluma where we saw Redhead, Blue-winged Teal, Moorhen, and Sora.

Pt. Reyes National Seashore Closure

As you read above, Ruth and her field trip companions were surprised and disappointed to find that Point Reyes National Seashore officials have closed Sir Francis Drake Highway just beyond the Drake's Beach turnoff. We have been unable to locate any media announcements regarding this change so it is very likely that many birders are experiencing this surprise.

According to a National Park Service flyer the closure was instituted on December 26th and will continue weekends and holidays until April 18th 1999. Although the flyer offers no explanation for the closure, the period covered coincides with Elephant Seal whelping and the local populations are expanding their use of the outer peninsula beaches.

There is bus service available from Drake's Beach to the Lighthouse and Chimney Rock for a \$3 fee. Beginning at 9:00 AM, the bus departs "on demand" every 15 minutes with the last departure at 3:30 PM and the last trip back at 5:00 PM . Unfortunately the bus does not stop anywhere in between and foot traffic is prohibited as well.
