This month's speaker Dan Nelson runs the Mollymawk organization conducting pelagic birding trips out of Bodega Harbor. Dan has been an RROS member since well before he was in highschool. In addition to his impressive land bird expertise, Dan has become an accomplished oceanic birder. Join him on the next Mollymawk trip which will be on Oct. 16th. The boat will depart at 7:00 AM and return around 5:00 or 6:00 PM. There will also be a deep water trip (1000 fathoms+) on Saturday November 27th and it will be the last trip for this millennium. These trips are moderately priced; the October trip will be just \$65.

The previous record was 176, set on April 27th 1985 by RROS members, Dan Nelson, Doug Ellis, Rick LeBaudour and Richard Merris. Congratulations to the new top team.

Mike did a second Birdathon on the following Tuesday, the 21st. Ted Eliot joined in and reports that their list included a respectable 167 species in Sonoma County.

The Mew Gull team: Kathy Mugele, Mary Rooney, Dan Noreen and Gerry Mugele also participated in the Birdathon on the 18th and ran up a list of 152 species.

Field Trip Report

Pt, Reyes National Seashore September 19th - by Alan Wight

Point Reves treated us to great weather and a nice variety of vagrants and migrants. Highlights included an imm. Peregrine Falcon of the pealei subspecies, two American and two Pacific Golden-Plovers, one Blue-headed Vireo and one Cassin's Vireo (a nice comparison), two Indigo Buntings, and an Orchard Oriole. Twelve species of warblers were observed including Chestnut-sided Warbler (4), Hermit Warbler (2), Blackburnian Warbler (1), Blackpoll Warbler (2), American Redstart (2), MacGillivray's Warbler (1), and Mourning Warbler (1). The Mourning Warbler was seen by Betty Groce only and had been present since the day before. Fieldtrip participants were Carol Brant, Ted Eliot, Betty Groce, Jack Groce, Katherine Hickey, Bill Payne, Bertha and Bob Rains, Don and Laverne Rickert, and Alan Wight.

A Case of Attempted Hummercide

Art and Hanna Richard, of Ingram Texas, banders of Hummingbirds since 1996, submit the following:

Mantids have been clinging to the sides of our feeders the past few years. They'd hang with one hind foot hooked in the band around the top of the feeder and their body arched outward, predatory (praying) legs extended. We assumed they were waiting for any insects that might come to visit.

They did show unusual interest in hummers, by tracking them as they approached the feeder. We thought how pathetic they were, since, obviously, any hummer would simply fly off with them. When you've taken a few thousand hummers out of traps you are aware of just how strong they are for their size.

Sunday, Hanna was out in the yard banding hummers when she heard a hummingbird 'crying' in an unusual manner. After the birds that she was working on left the area, she went to investigate. Not ten feet away in some bush salvia, she found a hummer, belly up in the foliage. She lifted the bird from the plant and only then saw the mantis that clutched it, with her mouth fixed to his throat. She ran into the house with bird in one hand and insect in the other. The hand holding the bird had blood on one finger. There were wispy body feathers in the mantid's mouth and in the spines of her tightly closed grabbing legs. The mantis was entirely green and matched the foliage perfectly.

The hummingbird was a male Ruby-throat, hatched this year and he weighed 3.1 grams. After a rest and a few good drinks he seemed to be fine. The (alledged) assailant was a Carolina Mantis (Stagmomantis carolina). She had a distended abdomen with female sex organs so was with children. Her measurements were: Thorax -39 mm Abdomen 22.7 mm Total length about 61.7 mm. She weighed 4.5 grams. She is also doing well and shows no signs of remorse. Folks, for any of you who might not have believed those mantis versus hummer stories...believe it. That bird wasn't going anywhere and would have surely been mantis food. So, would you intervene in a case of a mantis mugging a hummer in order to save the bird?
