We're Sorry to report that the female Prarie Falcon spotted by RROS members near Honey Lake did not make it. As reported last month, the injured bird was rescued by a young man named Dane Profitt from Buzzard Acres, the local recovery station at Standish California. The bird was x-rayed by a local veterinarian and found to have a broken bone near the right wing attachment points. At that time, the problem appeared to be simply a matter of immobilizing the injured wing. Complications caused her death one week later. Autopsy results are not yet available, but apparently jer death was associated with a bone marrow infection. What a pity to lose such a magnificent predator.

In any case the efforts of Buzzard Acres are to be applauded. They are currently working to establish permanent facilities in Susanville for repair and rehabilitation of feathered critters. If you are interested, can offer help, financial aid, whatever; you can contact the pricipals as follows:
