#### OBSERVATIONS

Most of the summer sightings have been wxciting birds from distant parts of the state. From the desert there are: Least Bittern, Verdin, Vermillion Flycatcher, Prairie Warbler, Summer Tanager, Scott's Oriole, Plain-capped Starthroat (Doug Ellis in Arizona.) The Parmeters saw 55 Chimney Swifts in Burbank.

In the Sierras, sightings include Pine Grosbeaks, Great Gray Owl, Gray-crowned Rosy Finches, Black-backed Three-toed Woodpecker, Williamson's Sapsucker, Goshawk.

Local sightings include: Semi-palmated Sandpiper, Golden Plover, Redeyed Vireo, Baird's Sandpiper, Buff-breasted Sandpiper, Pectoral Sandpiper and flocks of White Pelicans all at Bodega Bay. Little Blue Herons were seen at Palo Alto Yacht Harbor in August. A Reeve and more Buff-breasted Sandpipers at Point Reyes. Hooded Orioles and Lesser Yellowlegs in Sonoma. A very early Winter Wren met his fate(cat) in Sonoma on Sept. 2. And a Pileated Woodpecker flew through downtown Sonoma on Sept. 4!
