December 17, Sunday -- all day -- RROS Christmas Count

The compilation and dinner will take place at 6 p.m. at the Recreation Hall in Brookwood Mobilehome Park. Turn north on Calistoga Road for one-plus miles to Montecito Blvd., turn west about two blocks and turn in at the sign "7000 Brookwood". Arrive early enough to eat before the final tally at 6 p.m.

January 20, Saturday (Jan. 21-raindate) Bald Eagle Survey

An accurate, meaningful survey of wintering eagles needs nationwide effort. Inquiries, comments; Raptor Information Center, National Wildlife Federation, 1412-16th St., NW. Washington, DC 20036.

Calaveras Reservoir—wintering Bald Eagles—Access: I-680 south 9 miles beyond Dublin to Calaveras Rd., go left about 10 miles to south end of reservoir. Seope almost a necessity as birding is from the road. Check shores, treetops as well as aerial. At least 8 Bald Eagles here in 1977—also Golden Eagles. Work back along the reservoir, stopping in turnouts. If the eagles are not here—they may be at the dam at the north end or anywhere in between. Best time is January, February. The road is narrow, winding—bird with caution! (The above is borrowed from THE QUAIL—the newsletter of Mt. Diablo Audubon—with thanks.)

OBSERVATIONS by John Parmeter

After the great vagrant boom of October, November was a cooling off period for birds as well as weather. There were not nearly as many eastern variaties reported, but birding proved profitable nonetheless. Sightings were not concentrated at Point Reyes, but were spread out.

A Black-footed Albatross was seen from shore at the Pt. Reyes Lighthouse (hereafter PRL) on 11-12 (JP). Fulmars were widespread coastally, but two in Bodega Harbor 11-24 (JP) were most unusual. A minor invasion of Manx Shearwaters occured, with approximately 25 off Bodega Head 11-11 (BDP), 20 at McKarriker St. Park 11-16 (KVV), 1 at PRL 11-12 (JP), and 2 off Salt Point 11-25 (JP). A Green Heron at the Gualala River mouth 11-25 (JA) was either late or wintering. Two Cattle Egrets were at Pine Gulch Creek, Bolinas Lagoon 11-24 (JP).

At least 52 Whistling Swans were at the Garcia River mouth (hereafter GRM) 11-25 (JA) along with 1 Canada Goose (JP). Three Whistling Swans were at Salmon Creek 11-22 (CC). Two White-fronted Geese were at a pond on Ramal Road, Sonoma 11-19 (G&KM). One Redhead was at Salmon Creek 11-22 (CC). A European Wigeon was seen in a large flock of Americans on Bolinas Lagoon 11-24 (BDP). Up to 3 possible Barrow's Goldeneyes were at the north end of Bodega Harbor 11-14 to 11-21 (DE,DS). Single Oldsquaws were at McKarriker Beach St. Park 11-16 (KVV) and Highway 37, Solano County 11-17 (KVV). Three Harlequin Ducks were along the northern Sonoma County coast 11-25 (DE,JA). Hooded Mergansers were seen as follows: 3 on the Russian River west of Duncan Mills 11-12 (DH,JH), 10 on Highway 37, Solano County 11-17 (KVV), 2 at the Gualala River mouth 11-25(JA), and 4 females on the pond at 5 Brooks Stables 12-3 (BB,GM).

Rough-legged Hawks were reported widely along the coast. A single Ferruginous Hawk was seen near the Bodega Bay golf course ll-11 (DS) and again ll-14 (DE). The Madrone field trip found a Bald Eagle at Graylodge ll-18. A Prairie Falcon was seen at GRM ll-25 (JP), another Prairie Falcon at Goat Rock ll-12 (DH, JH), and a Peregrine was still at PRL ll-12 (JP).

An American Golden Plover was at the Spaletta Ranch 11-12 (JW, DS). A Rock Sandpiper was at Bodega Head 11-24 (ICB). Three Ancient Murrelets were seen off the northern Sonoma County coast 11-25 (JA).

A Roadrunner was seen on Butts Canyon Road, Napa County 12-2 (GM). A trip up Mt. St. Helena 11-26 produced 10 White-throated Swifts, 2 Canon Wrens and 6 Townsend's Solitaires (BDP,JP,JS,DE). A Brown Thrasher was at the Bodega Bay "rail ponds" 11-8 (DS). Two Phainopeplas and 2 Blue-Gray Gnatcatchers were at Lake Solano, Solano County 11-18 (KVV,JP).

A Tennessee Warbler was at the Bodega Bay "rail ponds" 11-24 (KVV), and 2 others were at Nunes Ranch, Pt. Reyes (hereafter NR) 11-4 (JP). A late Nashville Warbler was at NR 11-4, along with 2 Palm Warblers (KVV,DE). A Black-throated Gray Warbler was Lake Solano 11-18 (KVV). A Palm Warbler was at the Bodega "rail ponds" 11-11 (DE,BDP), and the Northern Waterthrush remained there throughout the month. A female Hooded Warbler was in Muir Woods 11-24 (BDP).

A Sharp-tailed Sparrow was at Pine Gulch, Bolinas Lagoon 11-4 (KVV). Two Lapland Longspurs were heard near Bodega Bay 11-6 (JP), and Laplands and Chesnut-collareds remained on Pt. Reyes until 11-12 (BDP). A Snow Bunting was found at McKarriker Beach St. Park 11-13 (Mendoncino Audubon) and another was at GRM 11-16 (KVV).
