OBSERVATIONS by Mike Parmeter

Red-necked Grebe: single bird at Doran Park 9-21 (John Parmeter), 4 birds at Drake's Beach 9-22 and 6 birds at Limantour on the same date (JP, Doug Ellis). Horned Grebe: single bird at Doran Park 9-21 (Benjamin D. Parmeter, DE). Eared Grebe: adult with 2 young at Petaluma sewer ponds. Young appeared to be flightless and begged for food. This constitutes the first Sonoma County breeding record 8-25-79 (Betty Burridge). Canada Goose: small flock near Kenwood 9-8 (Gerry & Kathy Mugele). Common Merganser: 34 birds atBridgehaven on 9-15 and 4 birds on the same date at Salmon Creek (DE).

Broad-winged Hawk: single bird at Point Diablo on 9-23 (DE). Three additional birds had been seen at the same spot earlier in the day by Rich Stallcup. Ferruginous Hawk: an immature in light plumage at Point Reyes on 9-22 (JP, DE, BDP). A Prairie Falcon was present on outer Point Reyes on 9-9 (L.C. Binford, JP, BDP, DE). Peregrine Falcon: a bird was present at

at Bodega Harbor from at least 9-12 to 9-22. It was most often seen at the SE corner of the lagoon, often putting the shorebirds into a state of panic (BDP). An adult male Merlin was seen well at the Mendoza Ranch at Point Reyes on 9-22 (BDP, DE, JP).

American Golden Plover: 6 birds at RCA Station at Point Reyes on 9-9 (ICB, BDP). A Solitary Sandpiper was present at Laguna Lake on the Marin County-Sonoma County Border on 9-2. The observer, David Shuford, is not certain which county the bird was actually in at the time of the sighting. Lesser Yellowlegs are sometimes seen in good numbers during the fall migration. On 9-2, Danvid Shuford saw 14 birds at Laguna Lake, and on 9-9, the Parmeters and Doug Ellis saw 3 birds at the same site. Pectoral Sandpipers: a single bird at Laguna Lake on 9-2 (DS). A single bird was at Bodega Harbor on 9-16 (ICB). Doug Ellis saw a flock of 15 Pectorals at the Lodi sewer ponds on 9-20. On 9-22, there was a single bird at Salmon Creek (BDP, Jack Arnold, DE). There were at least 6 records for Baird's Sandpiper in our area during the month: Bodega Harbor--1, 9-16 (ICB); Bodega Harbor--2, 9-12 (BDP, JP); Laguna Lake--1, 9-2 (DS); Salmon Creek--1, 9-21 (Phil Lenna, JP, DE); and Limantour--3, 9-22 (BDP, DE, PL).

An unusual concentration of Marbled Godwits was at the mouth of Sonoma Creek on San Pablo Bay on 9-19--an estimated flock of 2000-3000 birds (DE). Four hundred Avocets were at Laguna Lake on 9-2 (DS). A single light phase Parasitic Jaeger was present at the SE corner of Bodega Harbor between 9-15 and 9-22 (JA, LCB, BDP, DE). The big news of the month was the presence of one (or two) Buff-breasted Sandpipers at Doran Park between 9-7 and 9-16 (Peter and Carolyn Connors, DS, BDP, JP). On September 16, the bird was seen on the golf course at Bodega Bay (LCB).

Common Tern, an uncommon fall migrant in our area, was noted several times. A single bird was present in a flock of 25 Forsters Terns at Bodega Harbor on 8-25 (BDP, JP, Kent Van Vuren). Four birds were at Bodega Harbor on 9-5 (DE, Hal Corey), and 4 birds at Bodega Harbor on 9-16 (LCB). There were also multiple records for Elegant Terns: 2 birds on 8-25 at Bodega Harbor (BDP, JP, KVV); 12 birds were at Bodega Harbor on 9-16 (LCB); and several birds at Doran Park on 9-21 (BDP, DE, PL, JA). A least Tern was present at Bodega Harbor, this was early in September (Pete Myers -- the exact date is not known at this time, however Peter Connors is obtaining this information).

A Poorwill was calling at Surgarloaf Ridge State Park the night of our annual potluck, 9-13 (JP). A Pileated Woodpecker called several times and was seen flying at the same spot prior to the meeting (Bob Failing, BDP, JP). Willow Flycatchers, a regular fall migrant passed through in Sept. Doug Ellis REported 3 observations. Redbreasted Nuthatches have "exploded" from the mountains. Everywhere one goes this fall, the birds are seen and heard calling. Brian McCaffrey, who spent this past summer on the Alaskan northslope tundra, reported hearing and seeing a Yellow Wagtail in flight at the SE corner of Bodega Harbor. His summer work had made him thoroughly familiar with the species. However, despite careful searching by at least 25 persons, the bird could not be relocated.

John Sterling reported a Black-and-white Warbler at the Nunes Ranch at Point Reyes on 9-12. One (perhaps 2) Northern Parula Warbler(s) spent several days at Lands End in San Francisco. They were seen on 9-6 by BDP, JP, DE. A Prairie Warbler was present at the Fish Docks on 9-9 (LCB, JP,

BDP, DE). A Summer Tanager, adult male, was seen at Lands End on 9-6 (BDP, DE, JP). An adult male Indigo Bunting in molt plumage was found at Pacific Grove, Monterey County on 9-3 (BDP, JP, JA). A single immature Evening Grosbeak was in our yard in Napa on 9-23 (JP, BDP). Many Red Crossbills were at Lands End on 9-6 (BDP, JP, DE). These birds, together with the Red-breasted Nuthatches and the Evening Grosbeak, certainly suggest a montane invasion year. Be looking for other mountain species. A Vesper Sparrow was at the feeder of Bob McLean on 9-17, as was an early Lincoln's Sparrow. A single Lapland Longspur was seen at the Hall Ranch, Point Reyes on 9-22 (JP, DE, BDP). American Redstart--single bird at Lands End, 9-23 (DE).

Add to The Birds of Sonoma County:
Least Tern--2 birds at Bodega Bay, June 23, 1977 (Hal Corey, Jim wilson, Warren Minion).

The bird reported in this month's Observations is the second county sighting.
