# A LECTURE COURSE ON SPECIAL PROBLEMS IN FIELD IDENTIFICATION

This course is designed for birders who have become aware of the limitations of their field guides and wish to expand their field identification abilities. The material deals mainly with groups of birds that are difficult to identify such as immature gulls, shorebirds, fall warblers, immature and winter plumaged sparrows, longspurs, hawks, Empidonax flycatchers. The course is broken into six different lectures given over a six week period. Each lecture is appx. 3 hours long. Material is presented with slides and will be taught by Jon Winter.

# OBSERVATIONS -- by Mike Parmeter

Birding continues to excell with the great weather. Several Northern Fulmar were seen from Bodega Head Jan 6 (L. C. Binford, John Parmeter). There was a very unusual sighting of a female Magnificent Frigatebird at Sea Ranch on Dec 31 (Leonard Roth). Details of the sighting will be published in American Birds. A trip down Sonoma Creek Jan 19 yielded only one Green Heron where six were seen three weeks previously (Gerry Mugele). Jan 5, 34 Cattle Egrets were present on High School Rd. just north of Sebastopol. (J.P. Benjamin D. Parmeter) A single Ross' Goose was reported at the Rohnert Park sewer ponds on Jan 11 (Richard Merns). On Jan 1, 11 Wood Ducks were seen in a flock at Lake Hennessey (JP, BDP, Doug Ellis) and on Jan 19, 12 birds were seen on Sonoma Creek (GM). Barrow's Goldeneye Were seen several times this past month; Rich Stallcup saw a female at Bodega Harbor Dec 30, as part of the Western Sonoma County Christmas Count. This bird was not seen subsequently however. A male and female were found on a farm pond off Stoetz Lane near Occidental on the same date and were later viewed by many observers (Phil and Margaret Schaeffer). Another female was found on the Angwin Christmas Count at Lake Hennessey on Jan 1 (JP, DE). There is only one record for Hooded Mergansers; 2 males and 3 females on the pond at Five Brooks Stables Jan 8 (Ruth Hawksley, Hal Corey, Warren Munson, Stan Carpenter). Common Mergansers were noted several times, the best record being 18 birds on Sonoma Creek Jan 19 (GM). A well described immature Broad-winged Hawk was found near the town of Bodega on Jan 30 (Dianne McClung, Keiko Yemane, Gloria Markowitz) Unfortunately it was not seen again, although many persons looked for it. Rough-legged Hawks have been scarse this winter; a single bird at Los Banos Jan 10 (Clarence Tucker), 2 birds near Skaggs Island Jan 20 (GM, Bill Payne, Kathy Mugele) and a single bird near Rio Vista Jan 8 (DE). Ferruginous Hawks were noted several times from widely separated areas. Golden Eagle reports were also numerous; sites of these birds included Sonoma, Lake Berryessa, Novato and Petaluma. A Bald Eagle was reported just north of Petaluma (Ken Peters), and another was reported in the Putah Creek area of Lake Berryessa for the Angwin Xmas Count (Rich Bertoli). There were several sightings of Osprey, a bird formerly thought to be extremely rare in winter, but now sightings are increasingly numerous: location include Lake Hennessey, and Lake Berryessa. A Prairie Falcon was at Tolay Creek Jan 10 (GM). Single Merlins were seen in Petaluma Dec 18 (Betty Burridge) and at St. Helena Jan 1 (BDP, JP, DE).

A Blue Garouse(!) was found in a back yard on Spencer Ave. in Santa Rosa Jan 21 (Jack Arnold). It had been present for several days. Whence it comes, nobody knows! (good grief).

#### OBSERVATION (continued)

Five Sandhill Cranes were present at the north end of Lake Berryessa on Jan 20, the first record for Napa County (Phil Lenna, JP, BDP). Clapper Rails continue to be heard or seen at the bridge at the north end of Skaggs Island in Sonoma County. Two Red Knots were at Bodega Harbor on Jan 6 (LCB). On the Same date 11 American Avocets were at the Doran Park pond (JP). A Black-necked Stilt was in a flooded field on Ramal Rd Jan 20 (GM, KM, BP). A 1st Year Glaucous Gull was found at Spud Point on Dec 30 (Jack Whetstone) and probably the same bird was seen the on Jan 1 (BB).

A Flock of 60-70 White-throated Swifts was at Monticello Dam on Jan 20 (PL. JP) 5 or 6 Violet-green Swallows, about 50 tree Swallows and at least one Roughwinged Swallow were present at the pond on Ramal Road Jan 20 (GM, KM, BP). A Very early date for the Rough-winged. A Magpie was seen near Petaluma Jan 20 (Helen & Bill Heneks). Unfortunately the bill color was not noted. On the same date Yellow-billed Magpies were seen at the north end of Lake Berryessa (PL, JP). This may be the species most western regular spot in Northern Calif. A Dipper has been seen at Monticello Dam for some time. It was last observed Jan 20 (PL, JP). Two House Wrens were present on the Western Sonoma County Christmas Count, one at the entrance to Blind Beach State Park (Kent Van Vuren. DE) and one near the entrance to the BOdega Marine Lab Living Quarters (JP). Townsends' Warblers were seen on the Anqwin Christmas Count, this is unusual for that Area (Wayne Tillay). A female or immature American Redstart was found on Joy Road (DMc, KY). A Palm Warbler was at Doran Park on Dec 30 (Dennis Beale). A flock of Evening Grosbeaks was seen in Downtown Petaluma Dec 18 (BB). Dennis Beale found a Swamp Sparrow at Doran Park for the Western Sonoma County Christmas Count.

A bird, thought to possibly be a Tropical Kingbird, was seen in Kennedy Park, Napa on Jan 20 (Roger Hartwell). Unfortunately it could not be found the next day by other observers. A bird which best fits the description of a Sage Thrasher was seen near Petaluma on Dec 2 (H&BH). This bird also could not be found again. Both these sightings must be considered Hypothetical.
