FIELD TRIP RESULTS

The Hawk Watchers at Point Diablo with Dr. Monte Kirven on October 5 saw some 250 raptors sail by, mostly accipiters: about 150 Sharp-shinned and 75 Cooper's Hawks. They also saw an Osprey, 2 Red-shouldered and 6 Red-tailed Hawks. The day's observations included Red-breasted Nuthatch, Common Flicker, Glaucouswinged Gull, Band-tailed Pigeons (3 flocks), Kestrel, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, White-crowned Sparrow, "Audubon's" Warblers, Bewick's Wren, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Bushtits, and a Pectoral Sandpiper at Rodeo Lagoon.

The Pelaqic Trip to the Cordell Banks on October 6 sighted two whales, close enough for a good look. One was unquestionably a Humpback; the other had some of the experts wondering – was it definitely a Gray? or possibly a Blue? The pelagic birds observed included 14 Sooty Shearwaters, 120 Buller's Shearwaters, Pink-footed Shearwater, 2 South Polar Skuas, Pomerine Jaegers, Black-footed Albatross, Merlin! Kurt Campbell, Jules Evens and Roger Marlowe led this trip. The day was sunny, the water smooth as a lagoon.

The October 13th Monterey Bay Pelagic Trip on Debbie Shearwater's boat turned up rafts of Ashy Storm Petrels, maybe 200, with a sprinkling of Black Petrels. Pink-footed Shearwaters were numerous, with a number of Buller's Shearwaters and a few Sootys. An extraordinary 15 Parasitic Jaegers were around, harassing the Elegant Terns and whatever else came by with food. Four Pomerine Jaegers were sighted and 2 Marbled Murrelets. The day was foggy, said Richard Merriss, who led the trip, so no whales were sighted. But four species of dolphin were seen: Rizzo's, Right Whale Dolphin, Pacific White-sided Dolphin and Dall Porpoises. Blue Sharks with their small triangular double fins were common.

On a PRSO Pelagic Trip in Monterey Bay the following weekend, October 19, a rare Thick-billed Murre was carefully watched by two boatloads of birders as it floated with a raft of Common Murres. This bird had not been seen on the California coast for four years, and only four times before that, always in Monterey Bay. On this same trip, a Black-footed Albatross checked in briefly; and the tall, black fin of an Orca sailed by. The rest of the sightings were much the same as on the October 13th trip. The day was overcast but clear.
