Or drop him a note at PO Box 155, Eldridge 95431. A donation of \$3 is requested by National Audubon from each participant.

The Compilation and Pot Luck Supper will again be at the Wikiup Greens Clubhouse, thanks to Bob and Bertha Rains. Please bring something to share — soup, chili, sandwich fixings, dessert — whatever. You need NOT bring utensils — everything is there. Arrival time should be anytime after 5 PM. Final compilation will start around 6:30 PM.

To get there, take Hwy 101 north of Santa Rosa, exit on River Road (about 2 miles north of Coddingtown); head east to first stop sign (Old Redwood Hwy), turn north on Old Redwood Hwy about 1 mile, crossing bridge; take first right after bridge onto Wikiup Drive; proceed east about ½ mile; take right turn onto Las Casitas & then immediate left. 

11/15-Oakville Grade: 2 Varied Thrush. 11/16-Same area: 16 Varied Thrush (SP). 11/16-Kenwood: Redbreasted Sapsucker, Dark-eyed Junco species, similar to Oregon but no pink sides (RR).

11/18-Limantour: Common Snipe, Osprey; Muddy Hollow: 1 imm. Tundra Swan (MMc, JS). 11/20-Sugar-loaf: Northern Pygmy Owl, Varied Thrush; Woodpeckers: Pileated, Hairy, Acorn, Nuttall's, Northern Flicker (J & JT, DA, FB).

FIELD TRIP RESULTS

The Short-tailed Albatross that appeared at two of the several November pelagic trips made the Big News this month. This big dark bird with his massive light bill was distinctly larger than the other albatrosses that showed up on the same trips. Roger Marlowe's excellent slides of the bird allowed other members of RROS at our last meeting to study this oceanic flyer.

Which brings us to the fascinating news that both Laysan and Black-footed Albatross appeared at all five trips to the Cordell Banks this month: on November 3, on November 4 as reported by Jon Winter, November 5, 7 and 17 as reported by Kurt Campbell and Roger Marlowe.


Besides the 1 Short-tailed, the 2 Laysan and the 12 Black-footed Albatross on the November 3 trip, the other headliners were 7 Wilson's Storm Petrels, rare in this area. Other sightings: Flesh-footed Shearwater; Storm Petrels: 2 Black, 3 Ashy and 13 Fork-tailed; 235 Northern Fulmar, Short-tailed Shearwater, 10 Pink-footed Shearwater, 110 Cassin's Auklet, 22 Rhinoceros Auklet, 65 Sooty Shearwater, 200 Buller's Shearwater, 13 Pomerine Jaeger. Mammals observed were Blue Whale, Humpback Whale and Dall's Porpoise.

The birders who went out on the November 5 trip saw mostly the same species, but the Short-tailed Albatross did not appear on the November 7 trip and has not been seen since, so far as we know.

Another pelagic trip to Cordell Banks on November 17 again turned up with 2 Laysan Albatross as well as 30 Black-footed Albatross, 1 Fork-tailed Storm Petrel, 1 Ashy Storm Petrel, 50 Short-tailed Shearwaters, 30 Sooty Shearwaters, 300 Northern Fulmars, 35 Buller's Shearwaters, 3 Ancient Murrelets, 300 Cassin's Auklets, 15 Rhinoceros Auklets, 1 Blue Whale, 1 Humpback Whale and at least 20 Dall's Porpoises.

The next scheduled pelagic trip to Cordell Banks is for February 23, 1986.

BREEDING BIRD ATLAS - Update

Betty Burridge, Coordinator for RROS' Breeding Bird Atlas project, met with her planning committee on November 20. She reported on a tremendous amount of study, research and consultation that is essential to resolving basic questions about the project: Number and size of grids, method of measuring grids, tax-deductible status of sponsoring organization, financing, among others. Western Field Ornithologists, one organization in the world-wide movement promoting these atlases, will conduct a workship on Breeding Bird Atlasing in Sacramento February 7, 1986. Betty and several others from here will be going. They hope to have plans in place and ready for action in the spring of 1986.
