### Pelagic Trip to Davidson Seamount

Monterey Bay Whale Watch & Monterey Peninsula Audubon Society announce an exploratory 24 hour deep water pelagic trip from Monterey on October 22-23, 2000, for rare birds and cetaceans. The boat will leave from Sam's Fishing on Monterey's Fishermans Wharf at 8 pm on Sunday, Oct. 22, and return at 8 pm on Monday, Oct. 23 (weather permitting).

The destination will be the deep waters near the Davidson Seamount and beyond. Birds seen in this area in prior fall trips include Laysan Albatross, Cook's and Stejneger's Petrel, two tropicbirds, and Horned Puffin; research boats have located Murphy's and Dark-rumped Petrels in this vicinity. Rare deep-water cetaceans seen in this area in previous autumns include Great Sperm Whale, Baird's Beaked Whale, Sei and Fin Whales, Goose-beaked Whale (Ziphius), and several Mesoplodons. The cost of this first exploratory trip is just \$120 for 24 hours, a substantial bargain compared to most overnight trips.

For the first time ever, a 24 hour overnight trip from Monterey will be aboard a boat with bunks and a large indoor cabin. This is the new 65 foot "Sea Wolf II," a much larger and more comfortable boat than those used previously for deep water trips from Monterey. The primary captain is Richard Ternullo, Monterey's premier bird and whale skipper.

This trip, which may venture 100 miles from Monterey, is limited to 24 persons, and the first dozen to sign up will have bunks. All others will be guaranteed indoor sleeping space, so cold and wet outdoor sleeping will not detract from the adventure. You will need to bring a sleeping bag (and a pad if you do not get a bunk) plus your own food. Leaders are Steve Bailey, Don Roberson, Jim Booker, and Nancy Black.

Reservations are required, and the best way to reserve space is on-line at:

monterey baywhalewatch.com/PelagicTrip.htm. Space may be reserved there with a credit card through a secure server; final payment is made at the dock through credit card or cash. You can also reserve space by sending a check for \$120 to Monterey Peninsula Audubon Society ("MPAS") at P.O. Box 985, Pacific Grove CA 93950. Bunks will be assigned to the first persons to confirm reservations through credit card or checks. Refunds will not be available if you cancel less than 4 days prior to the trip; earlier cancellations may be subject to a cancellation fee.

Fieldtrip Report

Fieldtrip Report Point Reyes National Seashore September 17, 2000

The Nunes Ranch was the hotspot of the day. It was there that we had great looks at a Canada Warbler and a Northern Waterthrush. The other big highlight of the trip was watching as thousands of Sooty Shearwaters flew into Drakes Bay in a huge distant cloud. We made a crude, but conservative, estimate of the number of shearwaters in the flock to be 10,000. Other sightings of interest were a Northern Fulmar, close views of two immature Sharp-shinned Hawks, nine Pectoral Sandpipers, and a big flock of migrating Violet-green and Barn Swallows.

The fieldtrip participants were Carol Brant, Betty Groce, Jack Groce, Ian Morrison, and Alan Wight.
