

The Origin of Birds with Nick Geist

Once again travel back in time, along that sticky path in search of the ancestors of modern birds. Nick Geist, Paleobiologist and Assistant Professor of Biology at Sonoma State University will bring us up to date with all the latest information on this fascinating subject.

Nick's article, Non-Avian Avian Feathers in a Late Triassic Archosaur was recently published in The Journal of Science and in The Journal of Nature presenting new evidence of the possibility that birds evolved in trees.

Nick Geist graduated and received his Phd. from the Zoology Department at Oregon State University. His thesis work included research on the origins of avian flight, dinosaurian reproductive behavior and the respiratory physiology of living birds. His interests include the physiology and anatomy of vertebrates. We'll see you all there.

Good Birding Spots #17

Willow Creek Road by Deyea Harper & Kathy Mugele

The condition of Willow Creek Road is always an unknown, although it is usually passable. As of October 2000, Sonoma County Road Maintenance has a sign posted indicating the road is closed.

There is extensive off road logging by Mendocino Redwood Company. The narrow road is passable, with some considerable grading having been done by the lumber company. With heavy winter rains and all the new logging roads that have been cut into the hills, it is possible that the road really will be closed. Observe the "No Trespassing" signs.

Willow Creek Road turns off Highway One at the bridge over the Russian River by the Sizzling Tandoor Restaurant in Bridgehaven. Along your left, the south side of the river, are willows and alders with a place to pull off near the cattle guard. This is a good spot for river viewing of ducks, grebes, cormorants and other river critters, plus those hiding out in the willows. Approximately one quarter mile from Highway 1, the road crosses over Willow Creek where there is a large marshy area on the right which harbors rails--a rail tape is helpful in luring them.

At the bend in the road you can park and walk out to the environmental camp for some tree As you proceed up the canyon look along the ridge top for raptors, in the willows along the creek for warblers, and on the steep hillside for Rufous-crowned sparrows. The pullouts along the right side of the road often yields rails among the cattails. Check the willows around the second bridge, and then the marshy area near 23455 address for Swamp Sparrows. There is lush willow growth in the flat area of the canyon; pull off the road whenever possible to bird. Be sure to check the old barn area.

At Pomo Canyon Campground there is a trailhead for "Dr. David Joseph Trail" which leads to Shell Beach through some redwood stands. The open areas around the campground can yield Quail and other ground feeders. Across the third bridge it is possible to park, climb up to the ridge and hike back to the environmental camp.

Continuing up the canyon stop at wide pullouts to bird. The last farmhouse often has bluebirds, juncos and robins which can be seen in the open fields. It is here that the paved road ends. It is a beautiful drive up the canyon through Redwoods and Douglas Fir and further on into Oak & Bay woodlands. In this area many species of owls have been heard and seen as well as Pileated woodpeckers. When the road again becomes paved, at the top, you are in the midst of homes, but check the open hillsides between the houses and the orchards for birds. Willow Creek Road makes a T intersection with Coleman Valley Road: a left turn will take you into Occidental and a right will return you to Highway 1.

AOU Checklist now On-Line

Have you been avoiding going "on-line" and eschewing the benefits of the internet? Well it's now getting even sillier to neglect this great resource. The American Ornithologist Union has now put their AOU Checklist on the web at:

One word of caution: when entering the URL (web address) be sure to put the 'AOU' in capitals or it will not be recognized.

A Misplaced Shearwater

August 19th this year, a 12 year old girl returned home to discover a banded Manx Shearwater resting in the driveway of her home in Macomb County, Michigan! It is most impressive that this family of non-birders was able to track this bird's banding data via the internet. They found that it was banded in Ireland in 1991. Not only is this a first record for Michigan, but it may be the first inland occurrence of the species in North America.

The find is particularly odd in that there were no weather systems that might have contributed to the bird's presence there! A similar situation occurred three weeks earlier when a Leach's Storm-Petrel showed up in Ontario.

The bird was cared for at the Detroit Zoo but on August 24 it died.

Observation Errata and notes:

- In the September Kite Tales, we reported a Lesser Nighthawk at Bodega and credited the observation to Ted Eliot. This was incorrect. Ted saw a Nighthawk that could not be identified to species. At this point the report of the Lesser Nighthawk is in doubt.
- Dennis Beall, of Cazadero, reports two albino Chestnut-backed Chickadees frequented his feeders with a small group.
- James Sams of San Diego reports that a friend had mourning doves nesting in his yard. The nesting was successful. When the two young fledged, one of the adult doves inadvertently flew into his home. He retrieved the bird and found it to be covered with ants (he described them as red ants). The dove was apparently in good health. It was released and is still seen in the area. He now wonders what were the ants doing on the bird? Do we have a symbiotic relationship here?

Phone Wheel Update Time


The RROS phone wheel is now ready for the official update. Here it is with additions, changes and deletes included.
