Field Trip Report Mitchell Canyon April 22nd, 2001

We enjoyed great weather and lots of spring birds in this beautiful canyon. Our hike started with a nice big flock of migrants which included a male Western Tanager and two Hermit Warblers as well as Black-throated Gray, Townsend's, and Yellow-rumped Warblers. Further up the canyon we had good looks at a calling Hammond's Flycatcher and two more Hermit Warblers and fleeting glimpses of two Nashville Warblers. Other highlights included 1-3 Golden Eagles, some White-throated Swifts, several migrating accipiters, and a male Lazuli Bunting.

Jack Arnold Memorial Proposal

The Jack Arnold Memorial was discussed April 26 at SSU by an ad hoc committee made up of Phil Northen, Kelly Kjeldsen, Derek Girman (all from SSU Biology Dept.) and Betty Burridge (RROS.)

Naming and expanding the SSU Vertebrate Museum seems to be the most appropriate memorial for Jack. His part in establishing the natural sciences departments at SSU will be a major theme of any tribute to him. Suggestions, in addition to a suitable Jack Arnold Museum plaque on the door of the current museum, included a permanent and prominent display case which is to include not only exceptional vertebrate specimens prepared by Jack, but also a bronze plaque with bas relief sculpture (or a complete bronze bust) of Jack, to be done by a major artist. Donor plaques for minimum donations may be a part of the plague. Location of the display case will probably be in Darwin Hall, however the case will be built to be movable to a new campus building, which is being planned.

Costs will be considerable. The plaque can easily cost \$5,000 or more. Financing will be accomplished through a bequest from Jack's estate, the \$500 already waiting in the RROS treasury, and from fund raising efforts directed at Jack's former students, beginning with an appeal at a May 5 reunion at SSU.

The funds raised will be administered by an advisory committee made up of those present, plus Jon Winter and Mike Parmeter from RROS. — Betty Burridge


