# April 20<sup>th</sup> Saturday, 7:30/9:00 AM - RROS Field Trip Mitchell Canyon, Contra Costa County

This beautiful canyon on the slopes of Mt. Diablo is a wonderful place to observe newly-arrived spring migrants. It's a magnet for less common migrating birds such as Hammond's Flycatcher, Calliope Hummingbird, Nashville Warbler, and Hermit Warbler. Along with the birds come a nice variety of butterflies, reptiles, and wildflowers. Meet at 7:30 a.m. at the Petaluma Park-and-Ride for carpooling or meet at the Mitchell Canyon parking lot at 9:00 a.m. The Petaluma Park-and-Ride is located on Lakeville Highway in Petaluma just west of US101. To get to Mitchell Canyon, take Highway 680 south to Walnut Creek. Take the Ygnacio Valley Road exit east. Once on Ygnacio Valley Road, drive east 7.7 miles and turn south on Clayton Road. Drive one mile and turn right onto Mitchell Canyon Road. Follow this road for 1.6 miles to the end. Bring binoculars, hiking shoes, water, and a lunch. We will walk about three miles at a leisurely pace. Leader is Alan Wight. #### **Field Trip Reports**

#### Tule Lake and Klamath Basin Field Trip Report - February 16-18, 2002

Twelve of us enjoyed the scenery and abundance of birds of this area. Some snow fell on the morning of the second day, but other than that, the weather was quite nice. Lower Klamath and Tule Lake had lots of Tundra Swans, geese of all four species, and well over 100 Bald Eagles. Highlights included three Prairie Falcons, lots of Eurasian Wigeons, a flock of ten Great Blue Herons flying together, and a nice variety of ducks, including Redheads, Barrow's Goldeneyes, Hooded Mergansers, and a flock of several hundred Common Mergansers. We ended the trip at Lava Beds National Monument, where we saw Golden-crowned Kinglets, Cassin's Finches, and Clark's Nutcrackers. 98 bird species were observed. In addition to the birds seen on the field trip, several of us saw the Common Redpoll in Anderson on either the way up or the way back.
