# April 20<sup>th</sup>, Saturday, 7:30/9:00 AM - RROS Field Trip Mitchell Canyon, Contra Costa County

This beautiful canyon on the slopes of Mt. Diablo is a wonderful place to observe newly-arrived spring migrants. It's a magnet for less common migrating birds such as Hammond's Flycatcher, Calliope Hummingbird, Nashville Warbler, and Hermit Warbler. Along with the birds come a nice variety of butterflies, reptiles, and wildflowers. Meet at 7:30 a.m. at the Petaluma Park-and-Ride for carpooling or meet at the Mitchell Canyon parking lot at 9:00 a.m. The Petaluma Park-and-Ride is located on Lakeville Highway in Petaluma just west of US101. To get to Mitchell Canyon, take Highway 680 south to Walnut Creek. Take the Ygnacio Valley Road exit east. Once on Ygnacio Valley Road, drive east 7.7 miles and turn south on Clayton Road. Drive one mile and turn right onto Mitchell Canyon Road. Follow this road for 1.6 miles to the end. Bring binoculars, hiking shoes, water, and a lunch. We will walk about three miles at a leisurely pace. Leader is Alan Wight. Please call Alan (weekdays 7-9 PM or weekends any time) at 763-8572 if you plan to meet the group at Mitchell Canyon or if you have any questions.

# May 9<sup>th</sup>, Thursday, 6:00 PM, Year End Potluck Meeting Sugar Loaf Ridge State Park, Adobe Canyon Road

## Field Trip Reports

# Shollenberger Park and Port Sonoma Field Trip, March 9, 2002

Highlights at Shollenberger Park were two male Eurasian Wigeons, several pairs of Blue-winged Teal, an American Bittern, and four species of swallows, including Tree, Violet-green, Northern Rough-winged, and Barn. At Port Sonoma, we saw a single male Barrow's Goldeneye in the Petaluma River. While driving back up Lakeville Highway, we saw two Golden Eagles. Birds observed: Pied-billed Grebe, Eared Grebe, Western Grebe, Clark's Grebe, Double-crested Cormorant, American Bittern, Great Blue Heron, Great Egret, Snowy Egret, Black-crowned Night-Heron, Canada Goose, Greenwinged Teal, Mallard, Northern Pintail, Blue-winged Teal, Cinnamon Teal, Northern Shoveler, Gadwall, Eurasian Wigeon, American Wigeon, Canvasback, Greater Scaup, Lesser Scaup, Surf Scoter, Common Goldeneye, Barrow's Goldeneve, Bufflehead, Ruddy Duck, Turkey Vulture. White-tailed Kite, Northern Harrier, Red-tailed Hawk, Golden Eagle, American Kestrel, Virginia Rail, Sora, Common Moorhen, American Coot, Black-bellied Plover, Killdeer, Black-necked Stilt, American Avocet, Greater Yellowlegs, Willet, Long-billed Curlew, Marbled Godwit, Least Sandpiper, Mew Gull, Ring-billed Gull, California Gull, Western Gull, Glaucous-winged Gull, Rock Dove, Mourning Dove, Anna's Hummingbird, Belted Kingfisher, Northern Flicker, Black Phoebe, Horned Lark, Tree Swallow, Violet-green Swallow, Northern Rough-winged Swallow, Barn Swallow, Western Scrub-Jay, American Crow, Marsh Wren, Northern Mockingbird, American Pipit, Loggerhead Shrike, European Starling, Yellowrumped Warbler, Common Yellowthroat, Spotted Towhee, California Towhee, Savannah Sparrow, Song Sparrow, Golden-crowned Sparrow, White-crowned Sparrow, Dark-eyed Junco, Red-winged Blackbird, Western Meadowlark, Brewer's Blackbird, House Finch, American Goldfinch, House Sparrow. ### PLACES TO BIRD

#### **JENNER**

Located at the mouth of the Russian River, Jenner is another fine birding spot. Large numbers of birds winter here, including three species of loons, six grebes, and three cormorants. Marbled Murrelet can often be seen between the mouth of the river and Goat Rock. Common Merganser is regular throughout the year. Brown Pelican and Heermann's Gull are common in fall. In winter, Blacklegged Kittiwake usually occurs, and all three species of scoters are easily sighted near shore.

Many species of raptors have been recorded in the Jenner area, including Red-tailed, Rough-legged and Ferruginous Hawks, Golden Eagle, Merlin and Peregrine Falcon. Osprey is common in summer. Many species of shorebirds use the beaches and Penny Island for feeding and resting.

Don't overlook the ponds at the junction of State Highways 116 and 1. Common Moorhen has nested annually in these ponds for several years. Virginia Rail is a regular resident. Several rarities have been found here, such as Blue-winged Teal, Baird's Sandpiper, Pectoral Sandpiper, and Bobolink. A Fork-tailed Flycatcher was found at this spot in early September 1992.

#### **CAZADERO**


To reach Cazadero, turn north onto Austin Creek Road from State Highway 116 where it crosses Austin Creek, about 5.5 miles east of Jenner. The lower portion of Austin Creek, before you reach Cazadero, has some nice stands of riparian growth. In the summer look in this streamside growth for Yellow Warbler, Wilson's Warbler, and Yellowbreasted Chat. The small tributary streams of Kidd Creek and East Austin Creek are excellent places to search for an American Dipper. Dipper can also be seen in that portion of Austin Creek north of Ca-Also in the summer months, look for zadero. Vaux's Swift flying about the tops of any stand of redwood tress, but especially at Elim Grove, just south of Cazadero. On the drier hillsides and above


the stream, watch for Mountain Quail, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Black-throated Gray Warbler, and Lazuli Bunting. The Fort Ross Road, from Cazadero to Fort Ross, is a scenic drive with excellent birding along the way, but the road is not always easy driving. It is best to inquire locally about road conditions, especially in winter, if you plan to take this trip.

#### KING RIDGE ROAD

This road runs north of Cazadero along Austin Creek for a few miles, then climbs and runs along the top of the ridge until it joins Tin Barn Road, which eventually joins Skaggs Springs-Stewart's Point Road. Excellent views of the countryside are obtained on the drive along the top of the ridge. Along the creek the habitat is riparian and, back from the creek, it becomes broadleaf/evergreen forest. Atop the ridge, the area is mainly open grassland. The entire route offers good birding. Birds which are found (often just heard) fairly regularly include: Common Merganser, Golden Eagle, Blue Grouse, Mountain Ouail, Spotted Sandpiper, Band-tailed Pigeon, Pygmy Owl, Vaux's Swift, Pileated Woodpecker, Olive-sided Flycatcher, Purple Martin, Red-breasted Nuthatch, American Dipper, Hermit Warbler, and Lark Sparrow. The Blue Grouse are more easily heard than seen. During the spring, they "boom" from the tall Douglas fir clumps near the top of the ridge.




