Willow Creek Canyon Field Trip Report November 16, 2002

The area near Bridgehaven Pond had quite a few birds, including an immature Ferruginous Hawk, at least two Merlins, two Spotted Sandpipers moving up the Russian River, and a Palm Warbler which was foraging in the vegetation next to the pond. While in Willow Creek Canyon, the highlights were two Sharp-shinned Hawks and a Townsend's Warbler mixed in with a large flock of Golden-crowned and Ruby-crowned Kinglets. Late in the day, a few of us drove down to Bodega Harbor and stopped at the Doran Park jetty, where we saw a Longtailed Duck flying over in a small flock of Surf Scoters as well as a Red Phalarope, a Rednecked Grebe, and a White-winged Scoter. BIRDS NAMED AFTER PEOPLE By Michael F. Nelligan

This is the second of a series of articles about people for whom some of our most common birds are named. If you missed the first article, it appeared in the September 2002 issue of Kite Tales. Copies are available from the RROS Treasurer.

The following information is taken from two publications: Words for Birds, A Lexicon of North American Birds with Biographical Notes by Edward Gruson, and The Dictionary of American Birds by Earnest A. Choate. Names are presented in alphabetical order and do not include all names included in the above publications.

BACHMAN, DR. JOHN (1790-1874)

Dr. Bachman was a minister, not an ornithologist. However, he had two daughters that married Audubon's sons. Because of the close family relationship Audubon named the warbler Bachman discovered after him as well as the Black Oystercatcher and a sparrow. Bachman's Warbler is now thought to be extinct although it still appears in field guides.

BAIRD, SPENCER FULLERTON (1823-1887)

An ornithologist of significant stature, Baird was secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, first United States Fish Commissioner, and organizer of the zoological work of The Pacific Railroad Surveys. Author of several works on birds, he described and named several genera and many species of birds. This was done in the ninth volume of <u>Pacific Railroad Reports</u>. Coues is quoted as saying of the ninth volume, "This volume, published in 1858, represents the most important and decided single step ever taken in North American ornithology in all that related to the technicalities of the science. It effected a revolution in classification and nomenclature, nearly all the names of our birds being changed in accordance with more modern usages in generic and specific determinations".

As a boy of 17 Baird wrote to Audubon about a new bird he had discovered, the Yellow-bellied Flycatcher. Audubon answered, offering to name it. So started a friendship that lasted for the rest of Audubon's career. Baird's marriage to the daughter of the Inspector General of the Army enabled him to play an important role in shaping the discovery of the natural history of the American West. It was through Baird's influence that the surgeons sent to army posts in the west, and those that accompanied the various railroad and boundary surveys were also enthusiastic ornithologists and natural historians who were expected to collect and send back specimens.

BARROW, SIR JOHN (1764-1848)

An extraordinary Englishman, Barrow was able to accept an invitation from a friend to join a whaling trip to the North Atlantic and Greenland. It was during this time that he developed a passion for artic exploration for which he was so distinguished throughout the rest of his life. He, more that any other person not actually taking part in the operations, contributed most to the discoveries in the Artic during the nineteenth century. We find his name in Point Barrow and in Barrow's Straits. He was a founder of the Royal Geographical Society. Swainson named Barrow's Goldeneye for him, but the scientific name was preempted while the popular name has been retained.


