Results of the Santa Rosa Christmas Count - December 15, 2002

Thank you to compilers Ted Eliot and Bob Evans, Bob and Bertha Rains for the use of the Wikiup Clubhouse (and the candles during the blackout!) and to all who braved the rain to complete our count. The total was 139 species and 4 during count week. Notable birds or numbers are highlighted. Note the American Robin vs. Starling numbers – more robins than starlings!

Rare Birds

2002- staring William Hurt, Molly Parker, Andy Jones, directed by Sturla Gunnarsson

This film has several strange plot twists – sort of X Files meets the Audubon Society. All kidding aside, the basic plot has William Hurt's character, a gourmet chef in a little tiny town on the coast of Newfoundland finding his restaurant lacking in customers. His wacky neighbor dreams up the idea of carving a decoy of very rare duck, floating it in the bay just outside the restaurant and getting the word out to birders worldwide. The duck species is not real one (to my knowledge- I would have thought they would have picked a Labrador Duck!) This wacky neighbor is also hiding some secret light discovery in a tunnel that the government is after – this subplot was not necessary in the movie. I don't even remember how that is resolved...

The main story revolves around the chef and his personal problems, and guilt over the fake duck in the bay. Of course, business is booming as birders flock see this duck. I won't give away anything else except someone understands birders — one guy's car breaks down in the restaurant parking lot and the chef is worried they won't get it fixed easily, being so remote. The happy birder says "I don't care about the car- I saw the BIRD!"

Ruth's Rating: As a movie – two stars **, As a birder movie – three stars ***.

General Bird News -

The Laysan Albatross is back at Point Arena cove in Mendocino County. This bird stays around the small wharf area and flies out to sea and back so if it isn't there, so be patient. Late afternoon is a good time see it fly into the cove.

A **Sedge Wren** has been in Half Moon Bay since early December. The bird is on a trail at Half Moon Bay State Beach. To get there: take Hwy 1, take Kelly Road West and go to extreme NW of parking lot. Walk north past a campground and amphitheater to trial with ropes. The bird has been in this area lately near marker "7."


