Coming Attractions

Thursday May 8, 6:00 p.m. - General Meeting at Sugarloaf State Park, Kenwood

Annual potluck and evening bird walk. We will probably be at the picnic tables next to first parking lot straight ahead of the kiosk, but if there is an area free in campground, we will put sign at kiosk. There may be a parking fee. Bring a dish, warm clothes, flashlight, binoculars.

Take Hwy 12 to Kenwood, turn on to Adobe Canyon Road (Vineyards Inn at corner.) Road ends at Sugarloaf State Park.

Saturday, May 17, 8:00 a.m. - Field Trip to Geysers Road

We'll search for woodland, grassland, and chaparral birds along Geysers Road northeast of Healdsburg. Possibilities include Grasshopper Sparrow, Purple Martin, Mountain Quail, California Thrasher, and Blue-gray Gnatcatcher. Meet at the first bridge on Pine Flat Road at 8:00 am. Saturday, June 14, 8:00 - unofficial Field Trip to Annadel State Park

We will walk along Channel Drive and into the lower part of Annadel SP looking for nesting birds. We should see/hear pileated woodpecker, warblers, vireos, nor pygmy-owl, wild turkey, western tanager, flycatchers.

Bring binoculars, hiking clothes, water, lunch. Meet at horse trailer parking lot at the end of Channel Drive off Montgomery Drive. There may be a parking fee. Leader is Ruth Rudesill-call 833-6026 with any questions.

Field Trip Report - Susanville Area, March 28-30, 2003 by Alan Wight

The highlight of the trip was watching 14 male and at least 3 female Sage Grouse on their lek early Saturday morning. Other highlights in the Honey Lake area were five Redheads; one Whimbrel; a huge flock of Snow Geese on Honey Lake; Prairie Falcons, Sage Sparrows, and Chukars (heard only) in the rocky mountains east of Honey Lake; Lewis's Woodpeckers in Janesville; several Sandhill Cranes; and two Great Horned Owls on nests (one of which had two downy young birds poking their heads out). Eagle Lake added a Williamson's Sapsucker, a pair of Barrow's Goldeneyes, 1-2 Common Loons, and Cassin's Finches. On the way home we stopped at Lake Almanor and in Chester where we saw two Bald Eagles, three Osprey, a few Wood Ducks, and several Evening Grosbeaks.

A total of 115 bird species were observed. The field trip participants were Charlie Bray, Ted Eliot, Tony Kroha, Rick Lebaudour, Tom McCuller, Mike Parmeter, Cynthia Rathkey, John Rathkey, Don Reinberg, Ruth Rudesill, Ann Stone, and Alan Wight.
