Bodega Harbor Field Trip Report - October 18, 2003 - by Alan Wight

The morning fog lifted and we saw a nice variety of birds, including several highlights. A single dark Northern Fulmar was on the water near the harbor entrance jetties. Three adult Snow Geese were in the pond near the entrance to Doran County Park. Two Pacific Golden-Plovers were mixed in with the other shorebirds on the Doran mudflats. Two Elegant Terns flew over this same location in the afternoon. A single male White-winged Scoter was on the water off of Doran Beach. Peregrine Falcon, Merlin, and Red Knots were also seen. Book Review - by Ruth Rudesill

"Birding On Borrowed Time" by Phoebe Snetsinger (available thru ABA Sales)

I read this book in one sitting....I was amazed at the life and adventures of this remarkable woman. For those who do not know about her, she has the largest world life list of over 8400 species. She was killed in Madagascar while on a birding trip several years ago.

I found her story to be truly incredible – she didn't start birding until her mid-thirties and serious listing until her forties. She had a terminal cancer diagnosis and decided to go birding instead of dying. Her cancer went into a series of remissions and she birded almost full time for 20 years.

Mrs. Snetsinger had the means to do this and I was interested in her family's reactions. She does touch on missing important family events and had some family trouble due to her birding. (I was reminded of a time when I was impatiently waiting for my sister's wedding reception to end so I could go chase a Terek Sandpiper in Carmel.)

The psychology of her birding and reactions to her life events was very interesting. Listing became an obsession and seem to be the answer to any troubles in her life. But she was also very self educated in bird identification and kept very organized notes (without a computer.) She held her bird sightings to very high standards having to id the bird herself, documented with extensive notes.

Even if you are not a lister, I recommend this book about a true modern adventurer in our hobby/sport. The book is complimented with beautiful illustrations by H. Douglas Pratt and photos.
