Hey Listers!! The 45th Supplement to the AOU Checklist was published in the July 2004 issue of the Auk 121(3):985-995. For those not familiar with the AOU Checklist, it governs taxonomy (including splits/lumps, common names, scientific names, and order) of North American species. Note that the ABA Checklist is what governs the publication of the ABA listers totals. Here is the big news!

Cackling Goose has been split and is now a separate species from Canada Goose:

- a. Cackling Goose (Anser hutchinsii) [the small forms] includes the former Canada Goose subspecies hutchinsii [Richarson's], asiatica [Bering-extinct?], leucopareia [Aleutian], taverneri [part of the Lesser complex], and minima.
- b. Canada Goose (Anser canadensis) now includes the subspecies canadensis [Atlantic], interior [Interior], maxima [Giant], moffitti [Moffit's], parvipes [the other part of the Lesser complex], fulva [Vancouver], and occidentalis [Dusky]. More splits of this complex may yet to come.

The Big Year A Tale of Man, Nature, And Fowl Obsession by Mark Obmascik 2004/ Free Press

The Big Year is an interesting chronicle of three men who all decide to do an ABA Area big year in 1998. The three men are Al Levantin, Greg Miller, and Sandy Komito - all trying to break Komito's 1987 record of 721 birds in one calendar year. For listers this seems a daunting (and very expensive) task. The author does a biography of these three very different men, two of which are wealthy and retired, and one who works full time and is in debt when he begins!

The author has a great style that would interest even the non-birder in the race. The psychology of these men and the other people they meet on their respective journeys is fascinating. The author doesn't mince words about some of the negative aspects of this type of adventure.

A positive for the book is the descriptions of the various locations they travel to and the birds they see. I know there are people in our club that have endured the mosquitoes of Snake Bight Trail and the unbelievable conditions of Attu, seen the beauty of Cave Creek Canyon, and relished the excitement of a fallout on High Island in spring.

I recommend this book as a history of the chase and the life list. Non-birders will get an insight into the sport but may not understand or appreciate the excesses. I did notice that there are no vomen on the list of all time Big Years -hmm....maybe someday I'll go for it!

Note: There has been an on going debate on how to assign county to pelagic sightings. Older literature was going by straight latitude. The California Bird Records Committee website says they are going by Nearest Point of Land (NPL) Here is a dialogue about the county of several hot birds seen recently offshore from the Internet.

- "Dark-rumped Petrel in 300 fathoms, the area where a steep dropoff occurs between the (Bodega) canyon and the Cordell Bank (3806.82N/12331.65W), about 24 nautical miles WSW of Bodega Head. This is an area where we have seen gadfly petrels in past years. I'm not sure if this is Sonoma or Marin County "(Debi Shearwater)
- "The Department of Fish and Game has a GIS application called Spatial Locator. I was able to plot Debi's lat-longs on a chart and measure to the nearest point of land. Using that method, the Streaked Shearwater was 14.75 miles from Bodega Head and over 15 miles to any point in Marin County, while the Dark-rumped Petrel was 15.24 miles from Point Reyes and over 16 miles to Bodega Head. By the CPL method, then, the Streaked Shearwater was in Sonoma Co. and the petrel was in Marin. The Streaked Shearwater was at 3809.17N/12315.62W. Marin County? Les Lieurance did something similar to what I did and got similar results for the location of the ecent Streaked Shearwater sighting, but different results for the Dark-rumped Petrel. I recalculated and got the same results as Les the 2nd time the petrel was 0.3 mi closer to Bodega Head than to Pt. Reyes, so it too was in Sonoma County! "(Bruce Deuel)

The August 29, 2004 Greater Shearwater was in Marin County by Latitude but nearest point of land was Bodega Head. Les Lieurance did get a GPS sighting for the bird.


