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Saturday, September 17 - Field Trip to Point Reyes National Seashore

This is our traditional fall trip to this great birding spot. 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Lava Beds Field Trip Report June 24-26, 2005

We had a nice time exploring the area and observing a total of 145 species of birds. A few of the highlights were Pinyon Jays, Purple Martins, Brewer's Sparrows, Sage Thrashers, and Common Nighthawks at Lava Beds; a Peregrine Falcon and at least 70 Franklin's Gulls at Tule Lake; at least six Flammulated Owls and one Northern Saw-whet Owl (all heard only) west of Mammoth Crater; Gray Jays, a female Williamson's Sapsucker, and Red Crossbills (one singing even!) along the road to Medicine Lake; many Bank Swallows at the Fall River Mills colony; and three Bald Eagles near Burney Falls (but no Black Swifts). 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Movie Review MARCH OF THE PENGUINS by Ruth Rudesill

2005 – produced and directed by Luc Piquet. Narrated by Morgan Freeman. This is a French production in association with National Geographic about the almost unbelievable life of the Emperor Penguin. We, as birders, are familiar with the life cycle of the largest of penguins but even I was surprised to learn the real toil these birds go through in order to produce babies.

They march 70 miles in from the Antarctic ocean to secure ice and go back and back and forth through the egg laying ands chick rearing. The reason why they march so far in revealed late in the film, so the babies will be near the ocean in the short austral summer when they eventually fledge. It is truly amazing how these birds survive in the harshest environment on earth, especially during the wintertime with no food.

It is beautifully filmed and engrossing. And there is nothing cuter than an Emperor Penguin chick! I give it 3 and half stars out of four!
