COMING ATTRACTIONS

March. 11, Sat. 9:00 a.m. Field trip to Sonoma Land Trust's North Point Property

This is a repeat of the February 11 field trip, with the potential for some spring wildflowers (and continuing Burrowing Owls if we're lucky). We will explore the hilly area north of Highway 37 and east of Lakeville Highway. This is a great spot for Golden Eagles and wintering Burrowing Owls and offers nice views of southern Sonoma County. This is a nice opportunity to visit part of Sonoma County that you probably haven't visited before. We will hike about three miles and finish up around noon (though bring lunch just in case we take longer). The terrain will be rough in places. Waterproof footwear is recommended. Meet at 9 a.m. at the dairies complex on the south side of Highway 37 just east of the intersection of Lakeville Highway and Highway 37. The driveway for the dairies is right off of the highway. Bring binoculars, spotting scopes, field guides, lunch, water, and warm clothes (rain gear if weather is questionable). Meet at 9 a.m. Leaders are Alan Wight and John Brosnan

April 29, Sat. 9:00 a.m. Field Trip to Mitchell Canyon, Contra Costa Canyon

This beautiful canyon on the slopes of Mt. Diablo is a great place to observe newly-arrived spring migrants. It's a magnet for less common migrating birds such as Hammond's Flycatcher, Calliope Hummingbird, Nashville Warbler, and Hermit Warbler. Along with the birds come a nice variety of butterflies and wildflowers. Meet at 7:30 a.m. at the Petaluma Park-and-Ride for carpooling or meet at the Mitchell Canyon parking lot at 9:00 a.m. The Petaluma Park-and-Ride is located on Lakeville Highway in Petaluma just west of US101. To get to Mitchell Canyon, go south on I-680 from the Martinez Bridge and take the Treat Boulevard exit north of Walnut Creek. Turn left (south) at the first light and proceed a short distance to Treat Boulevard. Turn left (east) on Treat Boulevard. Drive 1.1 miles to Bancroft Road and turn right. Drive 0.6 mile to Ygnacio Valley Road and turn left. Travel 5.1 miles to Clayton Road and turn right. Drive one mile and turn right onto Mitchell Canyon Road. Follow this road for 1.6 miles to the end. Bring binoculars, hiking shoes, water, and a lunch. We will walk about three miles at a leisurely pace and eat lunch on the trail. Leader is Alan Wight. Please call Alan (weekdays 7-9 pm or weekends any time) at 763-8572 if you plan to meet the group at Mitchell Canyon or if you have any questions.

Field Trip Report Feb. 11, 2006. Field Trip to Sonoma Land Trust's North Point Property

Courtesy of the Sonoma Land Trust and its project manager, John Brosnan, who led the way, a small group thoroughly enjoyed a 3-hour hike on a beautiful "spring" day, the wonderful views of lands stretching to the west and south and forever preserved by the Land Trust, the greening of grass, the colors of early wildflowers, the singing of meadowlarks. Bird highlights were 5 Burrowing Owls and their burrows. The Long-eared Owl seen by John on January 7 was not in the area he had seen it, but a Great Horned Owl was.
