This will include a discussion of general life history, nesting habitat requirements and behavior, current and projected population trends, and state and federal regulations to protect this declining species in California.

FIELD TRIP REPORT - Bodega Bay and Harbor, Oct. 11th - Ken Wilson

Our field trip began, after the usual preliminaries, at Campbell Cove where the weather was warm with a light but cold breeze from the north. We were entertained early in the morning by a Kestrel attacking a Merlin amidst the hordes of Yellow-rumped Warblers that make this part of the coast their winter home. These sightings were soon joined by a Yellow Warbler, Orange-crowned Warbler, Common Yellowthroat, Lincoln's Sparrow and a House Wren. Our next stop on Bodega Head was for some the highlights of the day, if not for the Pigeon Guillemots, Rhinocerous Aucklet, groups of Scaup and Surf Scoters flying south, one of which contained a Long-tailed Duck, then for the large group of, up to twenty five Humpback Whales which fed upon the apparently abundant food just offshore. Additional sightings from 'The Head' were a group of Elegant Terns, many hundreds of distant gulls feeding near the whales, Surfbirds, Black

Turnstones, Black Oystercatchers and both Pelagic and Brants Cormorants feeding and roosting on the rocks close to shore. Inside the harbor we observed both species of pelicans and large numbers of shorebirds including Short-billed Dowitchers, Sanderlings, Black-bellied Plovers and Semi-palmated Plovers. Western Grebes, Eared Grebes, Pied-billed Grebes and Greater Scaup all rested in the calm waters at the north end of the harbor. Our total count at the end of the 'official' field trip was eighty-six species. Some members of the group continued on to Doran Beach.

<u>Birds of Northern California</u> by Guy McCaskie, Paul De Benedictis, Richard Erickson and Joe Morlan

This 108 page book, published by Golden Gate Audubon, contains useful information about the status and distribution of the birds found in the northern part of the state. Easy-to-read bar graphs illustrate the abundance of native species throughout the seasons. This volume was originally published in 1970, then was updated in 1988 and amended with additional material. Birding Access at the "Fish Dock" Residence - message from Joe Morlan

I have been negotiating with the park administration regarding access at the "Fish Dock" residence near the parking lot for Chimney Rock at Point Reyes. Unfortunately a few thoughtless birders invaded the private area around the house, which led the current residents to add new signs and restrictions. (Continued page 6)

I am pleased to report that I have received word from Colin Smith, the chief ranger at Point Reyes National Seashore, that the old birding access rules have been restored and the new signs have been removed.

This does not mean that birders can go wherever they want. As before, birders are allowed access to the trees in the surrounding quad, and the primitive trails under the trees, as well as the paved road in front of the house. The water tank area should only be accessed via the portion of the rear driveway up to where it reaches the last detached garage, or from inside the tree line just inside the entrance gate. Please do not cut or traverse the fence behind the water tank as that area is being revegetated. Access to the GARDEN, YARD and IMMEDIATE VICINITY OF THE HOUSE IS NOT, AND NEVER HAS BEEN PERMITTED. The park employees who live in the house are entitled to privacy. Please respect their privacy rights at all times and do not point your binoculars toward the house. If you see anybody infringing on these rules, please help by letting them know what the rules are. If we police ourselves, it's better for everybody.

Thank you all for your cooperation.


