<u>Directions to the May Potluck meeting:</u> From Hwy 101, take Hwy 12 East toward Kenwood. After passing Oakmont and Lawndale Rd, look for Adobe Canyon Rd., and the Sugarloaf State Park sign. Follow Adobe Canyon Rd. to the dirt parking lot, near the picnic tables. From Sonoma, look for Adobe Canyon Rd. on the right, just north of Kenwood. Meet at the picnic tables across from the parking lot at **6:00 pm**.

FIELD TRIPS - April 2013 and beyond:

Saturday, May 11, 2013 - Mines Road

Tell Mom you'll see her Sunday, but Saturday you'll be birding Mines Road. It runs south from Livermore along the eastern edge of Alameda County and can yield such surprises as Greater Roadrunner. Ruth Rudesill is well connected by personal history to Alameda County and has volunteered to lead this one. Meet at the Petaluma Park n' Ride at 6:00 AM or the intersection of Tesla and Mines Road (or the first pullover heading south from there on Mines Road) in southeast Livermore at 7:30 AM. Saturday, June 8 - Sunday June 9, 2013 - Sierra Owling

Join Gene Hunn in Foresthill, Placer County and environs looking for night birds. We'll bird Mosquito Ridge to French Meadows Reservoir by day, then do it all again after dinner for 6 possible owls, including Flammulated, and Poorwill too. Sunday we'll explore Foresthill Divide Road to Robinson Flat and maybe hike up Duncan Peak Lookout.

Official overnight headquarters will be at a very nice accommodating B-and-B 13 miles up FR 88 above Foresthill at 5100 feet elevation, the Christmas Tree Vineyard Lodge www.christmastreevineyardlodge.com (916-59-0141). They have six rooms, each with a queen bed and included full bathroom, plus three roll-away beds that could accommodate a third person in three of the rooms for a total of 15. The charge for each double room is \$100/night including breakfast and the facilities (lounge, kitchen, swimming pool). If you'd like one for just Saturday or Friday too, Gene suggests you contact them soon. There's also a forest service campground at Mumford Bar (about a mile above the B&B) or self-contained "primitive" camping along FR 96 (the Mosquito Ridge Rd.) at Big Oak Flat in the thick of the owling area (you can hear them while you sleep; I plan to.)

Wherever you plan to stay, or even if you just breeze in for the day, meet at the B&B at 9:00 AM after breakfast on Saturday, June 8. We'll bird past noon, take a siesta, then go owling into Saturday night. Sunday we'll sleep in, then convene for some daytime birding after brunch. I have an extended proposed itinerary from Gene for this. Drop me an email if you'd like me to forward it.

Late August or early September - Pelagic Trip

Last year's pelagic trip was such a success we figured we'd do it all over again, only earlier. This one's still a work in progress, but the plan is to ride with Captain Rick in *Pterodroma* season, probably hitting the usual North Bay deep water hotspots and looking for the edge of warm water and the possible glories attracted to it (think 5 species of Storm-petrels, dream of Cook's Petrel). I hope to get a weekend date for this, if it's not too late, and will be sending out a notice only by email to club members with sign up details as soon as they become known.

King Ridge Road Field Trip Report:

The King Ridge outing on Saturday April 13 was led by Prez Bill Doyle, with a strong assist by Helen Kochenderfer. They know the road well and many of their chosen stops yielded good activity of neotropical migrants. Shortly after lunch, the anticipated winds picked up and the birding slowed down, so we broke relatively early and all birded our separate ways back home. Forty-four species were seen by the collected group prior to our parting:

Pied-billed Grebe, Wood Duck, Turkey Vulture, Red-tailed Hawk, American Kestrel, Mountain Quail, American Coot, Band-tailed Pigeon, Eurasian Collared-Dove, Mourning Dove, Anna's Hummingbird, Allen's Hummingbird, Acorn Woodpecker, Pileated Woodpecker, Pacific-slope Flycatcher, Black Phoebe, Violet-green Swallow, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Bewick's Wren, Western Bluebird, American Robin, Bushtit, Chestnut-backed Chickadee, Oak Titmouse, Steller's Jay, Western Scrub-Jay, Common Raven, European Starling, Hutton's Vireo, Warbling Vireo, Cassin's Vireo, Orange-crowned Warbler, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Black-throated Gray Warbler, Wilson's Warbler, Spotted Towhee, California Towhee, Lark Sparrow, Dark-eyed Junco, Black-headed Grosbeak, Red-winged Blackbird, Western Meadowlark, Brewer's Blackbird, Lesser Goldfinch.

"PISHING with PARMETER"

I arrived home at noon, Friday, 12/19/78, having the afternoon off. Sally advised me that there was a Smith's Longspur at the Hall Ranch at Point Reyes. It was a first CA record for the species. Having the afternoon free, I immediately left for Point Reyes. Unfortunately, our son, John, was unable to go. Arriving at the Hall Ranch, I found a large number of CA birders; I joined this group which was watching the bird, and had it pointed out to me. Also, the field marks were clearly shown to me. I watched the bird for 15-20 minutes, following which it flew away, scared by a close approaching photographer. Even with considerable searching, it was not located again that day. However, I was delighted to get a "lifer."

Word was out the following morning that the bird was again present. Being Saturday, John left at once to try for it. Upon arrival at the Hall Ranch, he was surprised to pull up behind a car with the license plate "OAX MEX" – he recognized this as Laurie Binford's car. (Laurie did his doctoral thesis on the status and distribution of birds in the Mexican state of Oaxaca.) John wondered why Laurie was there as he was aware that Laurie had seen the bird the previous day, and Laurie never went twice, always getting the bird ID on his first visit. John joined the group of 7 or 8 people watching the bird. Laurie kept saying to John, "Look at the hind claw." After about 45 minutes of studying the bird, Laurie announced, "It's a lark, not a Smith's Longspur!" An English birder who was present at the time agreed, saying, "It's a Skylark." And so it turned out to be.

I was told by several birders who had been there the first day that they had figured out the correct identification on their way home. The bird came back to the same location for seven winters. At times it was giving a Skylark call in flight. Superb photos were obtained. The best were by Albert Ghiorso (who was director of the research team at UC Berkeley that discovered 12 new elements).

I saw this bird many times subsequently but was always a bit chagrined that I had initially taken the bait, hook, line, and sinker, as had many of CA's serious birders. *Mike*~
