

RROS General Meeting Sept 12, 2013, 6:00pm Sugarloaf Ridge State Park

<u>Directions to the September Potluck meeting:</u> From Hwy 101, take Hwy 12 East toward Kenwood. After passing Oakmont and Lawndale Rd, look for Adobe Canyon Rd., and the Sugarloaf State Park sign. Follow Adobe Canyon Rd. to the dirt parking lot, near the picnic tables. From Sonoma, look for Adobe Canyon Rd. on the right, just north of Kenwood. Meet at the picnic tables across from the parking lot at **6:00 pm**.

Save the Date: Thursday, October 10th, 2013 at 6:00 p.m.

Andrew Rush, a graduate student working at the Museum of Vertebrate Zoology at the University of California in Berkeley, will give a presentation on his study of "Western" Flycatcher vocalization, across the bird's range. Was this a good split?

FIELD TRIPS - September 2013 and beyond:

September 18, 2013, Wednesday: Rodeo Lagoon and Hawk Hill in southernmost Marin County. Led by Gene Hunn (707-981-7301; enhunn323@comcast.net) with guidance from local expert Don Reinberg. This is near the peak of the rare Broad-winged Hawk migration and, depending on the weather, could produce a large number and good variety of raptors. Rodeo Lagoon is a major vagrant trap and also attracts shorebirds and offers views offshore (expect to hike a mile or two around the lagoon). Time permitting, we could stop on the way home to check the Corte Madera Marsh mud flats. Meet to carpool at 8 AM at the Petaluma Fair Grounds parking lot, or at 8:45 AM at the Rodeo Lagoon Visitor center (take exit #442 off US101 just north of the Golden Gate Bridge, then loop back under 101 onto Bunker Rd. heading west). Finish by mid-afternoon. Heavy rains cancel.

September 28, 2013, Saturday: Bodega Bay Hot Spots for migrants. Led by Dan Nelson (bidsurf64@sbcglobal.net; 479-2918), who has spotted more rare migrants here than anyone. Meet at the big dirt parking lot on Westside Road at Bayflat Rd, 8:30 AM. We will check such famed vagrant traps as Hole-in-the-Head, Owl Canyon, the Rail Ponds, and Diekmann's Overlook; we plan also to check Bodega Head for rocky shore species and pelagics and the bay mudflats for shorebirds and whatever else. Bring a lunch or have some chowder at Spud Point. Heavy rains cancel.

Mid-October, 2013, on a Monday: Check out San Francisco's hot spots for migrants, vagrant or otherwise, plus shore points for shore and seabirds; refine your San Francisco County list. Led by local expert Dominik Mosur (Dominik Mosur [polskatata@yahoo.com]). Heavy rains cancel. Details TBA.

November 19, 2013, Tuesday: Field Trip to the Pope Valley area of Napa County. Meet at 8 AM at the corner of Hwy 128 and Silverado Trail, Napa Valley. We will bird the south end of Lake Hennessey (bathroom stop at boat launch) and then travel to Pope Valley. Bird the Cedar Roughs Wildlife Area and local farm ponds. Then to the north end of Lake Berryessa for lunch. In early afternoon, hit Knoxville Rd for possible Lewis's Woodpeckers. Other possibles: Hooded Merganser, waterfowl and grebes, Bald Eagles and otters. Bring lunch and money for parking. Heavy rain cancels. Leader: Ruth Rudesill, 707-833-6026 or ruthier@sonic.net.

December 8, Sunday: Visit highlights of the Mendocino County coast, led by local expert and noted nature photographer, Ron LeValley. With luck we might see famous Big Al, the Laysan Albatross, if he returns to Punta Arena. We will also visit the Point Arena lighthouse,

Van Damme State Park, picturesque Mendocino town (and headlands), Fort Bragg, and MacKerricher State Park. We have high hopes for Gray Jay, Harlequin Duck, Black Scoter, Rock Sandpiper, and Ancient Murrelet. Meet 8 AM to carpool at Sebastopol P&R; meet Ron at Punta Arena ca. 9 AM. Added bonus: visit Ron's photography studio in Fort Bragg. Return via SR 128 through Cloverdale. Heavy rains cancel.

Field Trip Report:

June 8-9, 2013, Foresthill/Mosquito Ridge/Duncan Peak in the Sierra Nevada foothills east of Auburn.

We had high hopes of at least hearing the elusive Flammulated Owl after Hunn located an accessible calling male two weeks before. However, on a beautifully warm, calm, dark night we heard just a few excited Western Screech-Owls on the mid-portion of Mosquito Ridge Road and deep silence everywhere else. At midnight we retired to our lodgings at the Christmas Tree Vineyard Lodge B&B, 13 miles above Foresthill, to sleep it off.

Nevertheless, the day-time birds, massive trees, and bright flowers and the comfortable accommodations at the B&B (complete with hummingbird feeders) made for an exciting exploration in good company of this nearest Sierra Nevada locale.

We gathered in Foresthill Saturday morning, birding the local cemetery early (nice looks at Hermit Warblers here), then made our way up Mosquito Ridge Road with frequent stops at likely-seeming spots where we heard Mountain Quail and enjoyed fine looks at Canyon Wrens and Black-throated Gray Warblers. For lunch we stopped at the Placer Big Trees Grove (where the stake-out Flammulated Owl wasn't that evening). We hiked down and around the loop through this northernmost grove of Giant Sequoias (among huge Incense Cedars, Sugar Pines, Douglas and White Firs), encountering a Red-breasted Sapsucker, Pileated Woodpecker, Hammond's Flycatcher, and Pacific Wren, to name a few. After lunch we drove as far as the French Meadows Reservoir, checking burned areas for Calliope Hummingbird, White-headed Woodpecker, Green-tailed Towhee, Fox and Chipping Sparrows, and riparian habitat for Dusky Flycatcher, Cassin's Vireos, and Nashville, Yellow, and MacGillivray's Warblers. We decided to attempt a short-cut back to the B&B on Foresthill Divide Road via a rough stretch connecting to Robinson Flat.

We revisited the high meadow at Robinson Flat more thoroughly Sunday morning, after a leisurely breakfast at the Lodge. Several of us hiked from the meadow to the fire lookout on the summit of Duncan Peak at 7116 feet elevation, meeting the lookout volunteer on his first day of the season. This high country offered Olive-sided Flycatchers, raven patrols, Mountain Chickadees, Red-breasted Nuthatches, Brown Creepers, Golden-crowned Kinglets, Townsend's Solitaires, Hermit Thrushes, Western Tanagers, Cassin's Finches, and singing Lincoln's Sparrows in the meadow at Robinson Flat.

Floral highlights included: Sierra gooseberry and Sierra currant, huckleberry oak (on Duncan Peak), western azalea, Macloskey's violet, Gray's lovage, Leichtlin's mariposa lily, mountain jewelflower, dusky horkelia, fawn lily, Pacific starflower, Torrey's (miniature) monkeyflower, mountain heather, scarlet gilia, checker bloom, prince's pine, bush monkeyflower, pine violet, Hartweg's iris, pretty face (a.k.a. golden brodieae), woolly mule's ears, velvety stickseed, and wild hyacinth, to name just a few we made note of.

"PISHING with PARMETER"

RROS had a fieldtrip to outer Point Reyes on 9/17/05. We had seen a Chestnut-sided Warbler at the Mendoza Ranch. News arrived about midafternoon that a Yellow-billed Cuckoo had been found in Owl Canyon at Bodega Harbor by Cindy and Leslie Lieurance. A hasty decision was made to adjourn the fieldtrip, and we reassembled at Owl Canyon. Shortly after our arrival there, the bird flew to the eucalyptus grove just north of Owl Canyon. Several people saw the bird in flight (looks like a falcon). The bird went into the eucalyptus grove, but was not seen again. I arrived the following morning at the grove, 9/18/05. Richard Merriss greeted me, saying, "The bird is in view." And there it was, on the east side of the grove, perched on a bare branch, where it remained for about 30-40 minutes. Many people saw it, and wonderful photos were obtained. Rick LeBaudour got a terrific photo with his new camera. He subsequently sent me a copy of this photo which shows excellent detail. A first county record for me.

This bird nested in Sonoma County at one time. There are records in the early 1990s for Laguna de Santa Rosa, about 5 miles south of Sebastopol. Grinnell and Wythe, in <u>Directory to the Bird-Life of the San Francisco Bay Region</u>, point this out. Dawson talks of nesting in the same area in <u>Birds of California</u>. There are few other records for the county: (1) A bird was observed in July, 1988, in riparian woodland along West Dry Creek Road (see <u>Sonoma County Breeding Bird Atlas</u>). (2) On 7/2/96 a window-kill bird was found in the town of Bodega by A. Cassidy. This bird was identified by Bruce Elliot of the California Fish and Game.

Yellowbilled Cuckoo has become very rare everywhere in California. The Sacramento River riparian area, which once hosted numerous birds of this species, has very few recent records despite intensive searching. Perhaps the Laguna de Santa Rosa Foundation will lure it back into Sonoma County with their current habitat restoration program. *Mike*~

"On Birds"

One sunny morning, long ago, in the Lee Metcalf Wildlife Refuge, south of Missoula MT, I heard a familiar vocalization, and looked up to see a familiar bird, and knew I had a lifer. As I followed the bird from branch to branch, I was aware that another person had approached me. I looked over, beaming with the smile that a lifer brings, to see an older fellow with a cane, and a pair of well-worn bins around his neck. "Got something great?" he asked, smiling. "A lifer!" I said, "Cordilleran Flycatcher!" Right away, his expression changed...he rolled his eyes. "That's a load of ****", he said, "There's no such bird. Dumbest damn split yet." He limped off, mumbling. I learned later that the doubter was a retired, and locally revered, ornithologist from the University of Montana, in Missoula. I wasn't about to drop a new bird from my list, just because of the doubts of some behind-the-times old grump. I let it go.

Since then, I've learned that there are a lot of others who feel the same way about the Pacslope/Cordilleran split, including some of our most respected local birders, and, lately, I've been trying to return to using "Western" Flycatcher to refer the bird in question...hard though it is. Recently, I've become aware of the research done by **Andrew Rush**, of UC Berkeley, whose doctoral dissertation addresses this exact question, and who will be presenting the results of that research to us at the October meeting. Don't miss it! **Ed.**


