# FIELD TRIPS - December 2014, and beyond:

**December 15, Sunday: RROS Santa Rosa Christmas Bird Count.** All wishing to participate, please contact your previous area leaders, or **compiler, Bill Doyle:** shortbill@comcast.net Compilation dinner will be held again this year at Coco's Restaurant, on Farmer's Lane, 5:00pm.

January 11, Saturday: Visit highlights of the Mendocino County coast, led by local expert and noted nature photographer, Ron LeValley. With luck we might see famous Big Al, the Laysan Albatross, if he returns to Punta Arena Cove. We will also visit the Point Arena lighthouse, Van Damme State Park, picturesque Mendocino town (and headlands), Fort Bragg, and MacKerricher State Park. We have high hopes for Gray Jay, Harlequin Duck, Long-tailed Duck, Black Scoter, Rock Sandpiper, and Ancient Murrelet. It is a two hour drive to our starting point. Meet 7:30 AM to carpool at Sebastopol P&R; meet Ron at Punta Arena Cove ca. 9:30 AM. Added bonus: visit Ron's photography studio in Fort Bragg. Return via SR 20 or 128 through Cloverdale. Heavy rains cancel.

**January 25, 2014**: Willowside Trail and Delta Pond and, if it can be arranged, Guy Smith's "Georgetown" movie set and resident **Black Hawk**. Meet at south side of Willowside Rd. bridge, Santa Rosa, at 8:00am. Bill Doyle, leader. Heavy rains cancel.

**February 1, 2014**: Wintering Raptors and Waterfowl of Solano and Yolo, 8:00 AM – 3:30 PM, Terry Colborn, leader. The open agricultural lands of Solano and Yolo Counties provide excellent foraging habitat for scores of wintering raptors, while the wetlands of the Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area are the winter home for thousands of waterfowl including ducks, geese, swans and many shorebirds. This all-day field trip will visit several local winter habitat search of Ferruginous and Rough-legged Hawks, Merlin, Prairie Falcon, Burrowing, Barn and Great-horned Owls, Long-billed Curlews, as well as the elusive and threatened Mountain Plover. We also expect to see a representative sampling of waterfowl and a variety of shorebirds at the Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area, a.k.a. the Vic Fazio Refuge. Participants meet the leader at 8:00 AM in Dixon in the southwest corner of the Wal-Mart parking lot located on East Dorset Drive at the Hwy 113 exit off I-80. ## Bodega Bay, September 28th, led by Dan Nelson-

This very well-attended field trip, led by one of our most respected local birders, covered the Bodega Bay environment thoroughly, and produced nearly 85 species seen. Stand out birds were **Northern Waterthrush**, and **Tropical Kingbird**.

### Pope Valley, November 19th, Leader, Ruth Rudesill

Despite the reports of rain, we didn't have ANY from the time we left the meeting spot until the mid-afternoon when the trip ended (the sun even showed briefly). Everyone who feared the weather missed a fantastic field trip! We observed over 80 species from Lake Hennessey, along Chiles-Pope Valley Road. Lake Berryessa and East Side Road was awesome!!

Thank you to Gene Hunn and Don McCarthy for braving the weather for this great trip!

Highlights: over 2 dozen Lewis's Woodpecker, 3 Yellow-billed Magpies, Cackling Geese, 4 adults Bald Eagles, adult Golden Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, Merlin, Rock Wrens, Loggerhead Shrikes, White-throated Sparrow, Redhead, and Hooded Mergansers.

# Sonoma Coast, Saturday, November 23, 2013. Leader, Gene Hunn

## Participants:



The Redwood Region Ornithological Society gull id fieldtrip started off with a bang as a juvenile YELLOW-BILLED LOON was spotted about 8:15 AM opposite the horse trailer lot on Bay Flat Road. I got a good look just before the crowd showed up for the field trip. It had meanwhile drifted south into the distance but we were able to relocate it about 9:30 AM visible from the Pot-o-Bodega lot across the harbor near the Westside Marina. We attempted to get a closer look but it could not be relocated on that side of the harbor. Hope it will stick around. Lots of Common Loons in the harbor and dozens or more Pacific Loons and quite a few Red-throated Loon offshore.

Lots of other winter waterfowl had returned to Bodega Harbor, including Greater and Lesser Scaup, Buffleheads, and Ruddy Ducks, plus a few Common Goldeneyes.

We then birded Bodega Head (Surfbirds, Black Turnstones, and oystercatchers), where we all gathered for a group photo shoot, which should allow an accurate count of participants, which seem to number well above twenty! Next stop: the beaches at the mouth of Salmon Creek where a few hundred gulls had congregated, allowing close studies.

We then enjoyed a scenic lunch stop at Duncan's Landing, which provided more oystercatchers and Surfbirds, many more Pacific Loons and Surf Scoters, a Red-necked Grebe or two, a few Common Murres, a Pigeon Guillemot, and a pair or two of Marbled Murrelets offshore. After lunch we continued north to Goat Rock beach at the mouth of the Russian River opposite Jenner for more gulling.

Our total list for the trip included eight gull species including excellent looks at adult and 1st cycle individuals of Western, Glaucous-winged, California, Ring-billed, Mew, Herring, and Thayer's Gulls plus hybrid Glaucous-winged x Western and Glaucous-winged x Herring Gulls. These were best studied standing on the sand at the two river mouths. One immature

Heermann's Gull was spotted flying south off Bodega Head. Also four Forster's Terns were a bit of a surprise at the end of the trip off Doran Spit.

We enjoyed a clean sweep of the grebes (six species) and cormorants (three species), a single latish flock of Brown Pelicans cruised south and a distant Ancient Murrelet was spotted off Bodega Head. Lots of Brant had just returned to Bodega Harbor and there were two Snow Geese at Jenner, a possible female Barrow's Goldeneye on the Russian River, and a few Redbreasted Mergansers here and there.

Scans of the ridges at our back turned up a distant Ferruginous Hawk and a Peregrine Falcon among the Turkey Vultures.

A fine day to be birding!

#### "PISHING with PARMETER" SOOTY (BLUE) GROUSE

During the late 1960's and early 1970's I heard rumors of Blue Grouse (now Sooty Grouse) in the area of Skaggs Springs Road, but had never actually spoken to someone who had seen or heard the bird. Jack and Betty Guggolz, while doing a botanic survey west of Cloverdale for the Corps of Engineers prior to the filling of Lake Sonoma, heard grouse. This was at Thompson Ridge, 4/19/79. They returned to the same area on 4/15/80 and heard 3 birds "booming", and saw an additional bird.

It wasn't until 4/4/81 that son, John, and I went to Thompson Ridge with Jack Guggolz. Three birds were heard "booming." I looked west and saw Rock Pile Road. On the same day we birded Rock Pile Road and recorded 6 birds. A trip to the same place on 4/9/83 showed 14 birds. Doug Ellis took up the challenge, began surveying for this species, and found it to be present on Meyers Grade, King Ridge Road, Tin Barn Road, and the areas of Seaview, Annapolis, and Skaggs Springs Road. The earliest day it has been noted "booming" is 2/14/95, and the latest is 6/27/88. Both the latter records are by David Hofmann. The Sonoma County Breeding Bird Atlas lists no confirmed nesting, 1 probable, and 2 possible.

Grinnell and Wyeth, in <u>The Directory to the Bird-Life of the San Francisco Bay Region</u>, note birds occurring in Bodega (1854), in the "Russian River Mountains" (1860), and near Seaview (1915).

The best way to locate the bird is to drive along King Ridge Road and listen near the Douglas Fir trees at the top of the ridge. The voice is very low pitched and difficult for some people to hear.

As recently as 9/26/09, while doing a PRBO Big Day, we recorded a female with 3 grown young, 3 birds together, and another 2 together, for a total of 9 birds. My most recent observation was on 3/10/12 when a bird was heard on King Ridge Road just before the farm.

#### Solstice Tale

It was December 22, 1926. Sammy Linder stepped out of the warm kitchen into the mudroom, on his way out to the wood shed. He checked the outdoor bulb thermometer through the frosted window...16 below...about normal for Northern Montana at the end of December. He pulled on his jacket, fur hat, and gloves, and stepped into his pacs. The air outside was still and clear; the sun just rising through the bare trees across the lake.

Reaching for the door latch of the shed, he noticed a fluffy lump in a small depression, below the birch that guarded the door. A redpoll on its side, still, dead or alive, Sammy couldn't tell. Back in the kitchen, he dropped the wood into the bin, and held the bird out to his mother, who was rolling out a pie crust on the big kitchen table.

"Oh, the sweet thing", she said, "put it in a little box on the hearth, and see if we can warm it back to life."

Three hours later, the redpoll was not only alive, it was lively, hopping around in the box, and even pecking at the bit of seed that Sammy had sprinkled in. Sammy knew from long training that his family did not make pets of found wild animals, and that it was time for the bird to go back outside to fend for itself. Back out at the birch, he opened his hands; the bird looked back at him, and then flew strongly up to a high branch and began to chip. Sammy smiled, but as he turned toward the house, he was startled by a close swooshing of wings, and spun around to see a pygmy owl snatch the redpoll off its perch, and fly with it to an old snag by the lake shore. Sammy, shocked, burst into tears, and ran for the house.

His mother was just slipping the huckleberry pie into the oven. She hugged Sammy into her flour-dusted apron, then sat in front of him, holding both his hands. Sammy's dad had heard the teary story, and stood listening by the door of the den

"Sammy", she said, "I know it seems unfair. You can't help feeling that that lovely little bird was yours, after you coaxed it back to life. But what do you suppose that owl would think, if he could think the way we do? Don't you think that you might be its hero just now, and that he might think that that redpoll was the best solstice gift he could ever get?"

Sammy looked at his mom, and tried to smile, but couldn't bring it off. He hugged his mom again, and wandered into the front room, to sit in front of the fire. He didn't see his dad's wink above his head, as he passed by.

At the table, after grace, Sammy watched his dad carve the solstice goose, and a thought came to him.

"So, Dad, "he said, "is it like we're the owl, and the goose is the redpoll?"

"You got it, Sam," said his dad, "how bout a leg for you?" ~Bill Doyle


