Proceed to Administration Bldg. at SE corner of the plant. From Hwy 12, take Llano Rd. south about 3 miles. Plant is on the left.

### FIELD TRIPS - February 2014, and beyond:

March 21-23, Friday through Sunday: Honey Lake Sage Grouse plus winter birds of the Great Basin and east side of the Sierra. Rick Le Baudour leads. (707-974-0004). We will spend the better part of three days birding the Susanville area in Lassen County. The main focus of this trip is to see Greater Sage-grouse on the lek. That means leaving the hotel at about 4:15 AM on Saturday. Depending on weather and road conditions, some walking (a mile or so) may be required to get to the lek. We will also explore both units of the Honey Lake Wildlife Refuge, Janesville grade for mountain birds, and various other stops along the way. Other specialty birds seen in the past include Northern Goshawk, Prairie Falcon, Lewis's Woodpecker, Northern Shrike, the newly recognized Sagebrush Sparrow, American Tree Sparrow, Harris sparrow, etc. The River Inn is the hotel we have used in the past (530 257-6051). There is also a Super 8 in town (530-257-2782). The trip begins officially on Friday morning at 8:30 in the parking lot at The River Inn. Bring your optics, especially spotting scopes, food for lunches and lots of layers of warm clothing. The temperature at the lek can be in the mid-teens. We will dine out for breakfast and dinner. Feel free to call with any questions regarding this trip. Please check with Rick in case weather affects plans at the last minute. Approximate driving time is 5 to 51/2 hours, birding not included. If you plan to drive up Friday morning call Rick to find out where to meet later on Friday.

April 12, Saturday: Mines Rd and Del Valle in Livermore, Alameda County: Leader: Ruthie Rudesill, 707-833-6026, evenings. ruthier@sonic.net There is potential for some very interesting birds including Roadrunner, Lawrence's Goldfinch, Phainopepla, Rufous-crowned Sparrow. This will be an all day excursion. Bring binoculars, scopes, layers of clothing, lunch and beverages. There is an entrance fee to Del Valle Reservoir Park. It was \$6 last year (+ Bridge Toll for the Benicia Bridge). Car pooling is encouraged. Meet at the Park n Ride at Hwy 116 x 121 in south Sonoma at 7am. Heavy rain cancels.

#### FIELD TRIP REPORTS:

Wintering Raptors and Waterfowl of Solano and Yolo Redwood Region Ornithological Society February 1, 2014

Twenty-seven birders joined Terry Colborn for a day-long trek through the open agricultural lands of Solano and Yolo Counties. Our first stop on Cook Lane, south of Dixon, provided views of several raptors, including a Golden Eagle perched atop a transmission tower. We also spotted our first of 9 Loggerhead Shrikes. Lisa Hug's sharp eyes picked out a pair of

Great Horned Owls roosting in a nearby tree, affording everyone good scope views. Several Wilson's Snipe zipped out from the wetlands, while a Virginia Rail called numerous times from deep within the cattails. A cooperative Green Heron in perfect light afforded everyone stunning views. Moving on to Jepson Prairie, a few of the first carloads of birders saw a Ferruginous Hawk alight from the Eucalyptus grove and disappear in the distance. Our eyes scanned all the perches until we found a beautiful Prairie Falcon teed up in great light. Olcott Lake, usually a 93 acre winter and spring playa, was dry as a bone, and looked more like the surrounding open grasslands. With devastating drought conditions lingering on, there were no vernal pools present, in what may prove to be one of the worst spring wildflower blooms on record.

We continued on to Flannery Road were we found three cooperative Burrowing Owls, one of which was perched on a fence post as we drove by, affording some great photo opts. Although we searched in vain, we couldn't locate a single Mt Plover; eBird records indicate they are usually gone from the Central Valley by about 7 February. A dozen Long-billed Curlew were a nice consolation for our efforts. As our caravan drove along Robinson Road, we spotted a Ferruginous Hawk as it flew directly in front of the lead vehicle. We added several Red-tailed Hawks, American Kestrel and several more Loggerhead Shrikes, before rolling on to the Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area east of Davis.

The abundance of waterfowl in the YBWA was evident by our first stop, where we found 11 species of ducks, including good numbers of Northern Pintail, Northern Shoveler, Greenwinged and Cinnamon Teal, Common Goldeneye, Bufflehead and Gadwall. At our second stop, we scoped scores of Tundra Swan. With his eyes always looking for a rarity, Noah Arthur picked out a "Bewick's" Swan, a subspecies of Tundra Swan from Asia and Europe. During our lunch break, we heard a Sora calling from the wetlands, while numerous Mash Wren sang from their reedy perches, no doubt already staking out their territories. A Lincoln's Sparrow made an all-too-brief appearance. Though the day was getting late, several folks opted to continue on with Terry for a chance to visit a nearby ag area that has recently been serving as a nighttime roost for over one-hundred Northern Harriers; quite a spectacle to behold! There were already dozens of harriers coursing over the fields when we arrived. We watched as the sun set and their numbers continued to increase. A female Peregrine Falcon, perched on a nearby transmission tower, watched for any wayward prey. Just before dusk, we were rewarded with nice views of several Short-eared Owls, as they emerged from the tall grasses and went about foraging for their dinner. A great way to end a great day of birding!

While the birding seemed a little slow at times, particularly in the morning, we nonetheless tallied 72 species for the day.

## South Sonoma County, February 15, 2014

On Saturday, February 15th, **Lisa Hug** led a field trip around many of the birdiest spots of southernmost Sonoma County. The day started at Port Sonoma, on the Petaluma River. After scoping the river and marina, and spotting a Peregrine Falcon, as well as a wealth of shorebirds and waders, the group moved to nearby Reclamation Rd., where highlights included a Prairie Falcon and a flock of Horned Larks in the fields to the south. Also at Reclamation Rd. was a beautiful male Selasphorous hummingbird, enjoyed by everyone. After much discussion, the bird was not identified as to species, but Rufous/Allen's is a treat any time. Moving on to Hudeman Slough, another Peregrine was seen, as well as two Redheads, in addition to many other fine birds. Thank you, Lisa.


